Re: Proposed Inclusion of KKS Territory in the Agricultural Land Reserve

Dear Ms. Grout:

I. Introduction

We write on behalf of the Katzie, Kwantlen and Semiahmoo First Nations (KKS) with respect to the Agricultural Land Commission's proposal to include lands located at 192nd Street and 40th Avenue, Surrey, British Columbia (KKS Trade Lands) within the Agricultural Land Reserve (Proposed Inclusion). Specifically, we wish to address the ALC's disregard for the scope of its jurisdiction to designate lands under the *Agricultural Land Commission Act*, its egregious failure to fulfill its constitutional obligations to KKS with respect to the Proposed Inclusion, and its interference with KKS's ongoing negotiations with Canada.

II. The KKS Trade Lands

As you are aware, our ancestors have occupied, governed, stewarded, and used the KKS Trade Lands since time immemorial, and continue to do so except where expressly prohibited by government regulation, displacement, and development. We collectively hold and exercise inherent and constitutionally protected rights, including Aboriginal title, over the KKS Trade Lands based on our traditional, exclusive, and sufficient occupation at all relevant times.

As our legal counsel explained to you in their letter of January 6, 2023, the KKS Trade Lands historically comprised a vital component of our society and economy. We used the KKS Trade Lands extensively for travel, trade, and the harvesting of resources. The KKS Trade Lands were an integral part of the main trading route between our communities, and as such were fundamental in facilitating the trade of shellfish inland to Katzie and Kwantlen, and other

resources such as deer, elk, and salmon West towards Semiahmoo. The KKS Trade Lands were, and continue to be, of deep cultural, spiritual, and economic importance to us.

Additionally, the KKS Trade Lands are uniquely important to KKS because they are some of the last undeveloped lands within our territories. Since the time of colonization our territories have been subject to ongoing and extensive commercial and residential development. The land available to us for the exercise of our inherent and constitutionally protected rights, which is essential to our collective culture, has been systematically diminished to an almost non-existent level. The value and importance of the KKS Trade Lands to KKS cannot be overstated given that they are some of the very last lands within our territories which remain undeveloped and available for us to use, steward, manage and benefit from, including economically, in accordance with our constitutionally protected rights.

III.ALC's Lack of Jurisdiction

As you are aware, the KKS Trade Lands are currently held and administered as public lands by the federal government and are subject to federal jurisdiction. The ALC, as a provincially appointed body, does not have the jurisdiction to designate federal public land, including the KKS Trade Lands, as ALR land. The Proposed Inclusion would impact the federal government's ability to manage and administer the KKS Trade Lands in a manner consistent with its obligations to the public and to KKS and therefore constitutes an unacceptable interference with federal jurisdiction.

The ALC does not have the authority to unilaterally alter the nature of federally held public land. It is irrelevant that a provincial designation as ALR land may not affect the KKS Trade Lands until such time as the lands may be transferred to the provincial government. Pre-emptively issuing an ALR designation over federal public land amounts to an improper exercise of the ALC's jurisdiction and authority.

Furthermore, the ALC's designation attempt appears to have clear political motivations. The ALC has failed to explain why, with no advance notice to directly impacted First Nations, it decided *on its own accord* (i.e. without any publicly disclosed external application or request) to initiate a process to designate the KKS Trade Lands as ALR lands when it knew these lands were federally held public lands subject to a very strong Aboriginal title claim by local First Nations.

Regardless of the ALC's motivations behind its unilateral and improper attempt to designate the KKS Trade Lands as ALR land, it simply does not have the jurisdiction to do so. If the ALC purports to add the KKS Trade Land to ALC, KKS will judicially review this decision.

IV. ALC's Failure to Fulfill its Obligations to KKS

As outlined above, the ALC does not have the jurisdiction to designate the KKS Trade Lands as ALR lands. However, as the ALC appears determined to continue its extra jurisdictional efforts to include the KKS Trade Lands in the ALR, we remind you that the ALC has utterly failed to fulfill (or, shockingly, even attempt to fulfill) the ALC's constitutional obligation to consult and accommodate KKS with respect to the Proposed Inclusion.

For reasons we cannot comprehend, the ALR is rapidly advancing a top-down, one-sided public engagement process related to the Proposed Inclusion that is fully inconsistent with the Province's constitutional obligations to consult and accommodate KKS.

Given the very high strength of our claim to the KKS Trade Lands and the risk of significant, potentially permanent, impacts on our rights, the Provincial duty to consult and accommodate KKS with respect to the Proposed Inclusion lies at the highest end of the consultation spectrum outlined in *Haida*. Accordingly, the ALC must be prepared to negotiate satisfactory interim solutions, adjust its plans where necessary, enable our participation in the decision-making process, ensure adequate economic accommodation, and seek our consent before arriving at a decision.

To be clear, the potential impacts of the Proposed Inclusion on our constitutionally protected rights are of the highest magnitude. Restricting the KKS Trade Lands to only those activities outlined in the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* will permanently foreclose on KKS's ability to exercise our right to use and benefit from the KKS Trade Lands, including economically, in a manner that is consistent with our inherent right to govern, steward and manage our lands as we see fit.

To-date, the ALC has completely failed to fulfill its constitutional obligations to consult and accommodate KKS with respect to the Proposed Inclusion. First, the ALC decided to initiate a process to designate the KKS Trade Lands as ALR lands and hold a public engagement meeting regarding the same without providing any notice to KKS, let alone an opportunity to discuss initial concerns and co-development options. After learning of the meeting from a third party, we immediately notified the ALC of our claim to the KKS Trade Lands by way of a letter dated January 6, 2023. We requested that the public meeting be cancelled to allow for the necessary engagement with KKS. The ALC chose to disregard our request and proceeded to hold the public meeting despite our objections.

In a letter to KKS dated January 10, 2023, the ALC informed us that we were "welcome to attend and participate" in the public meeting and could provide written submissions for the ALC's consideration. In an email to KKS dated January 12, 2023, the ALC offered to meet with KKS representatives to "facilitate getting KKS perspectives on the record to be considered by the Commission."

Refusing our requests to enter a meaningful consultation process and offering to simply "consider" the perspective of KKS constitutes an egregious failure of the ALC's constitutional obligation to consult and accommodate KKS in the present situation. The ALC's approach to engagement fails to account for KKS' constitutional rights and the ALC's corresponding obligations. An "information sharing" and one-sided "perspective consideration" approach to consultation is rarely acceptable, and never in a situation where the impacted First Nations have a high strength of claim such as KKS's claim over the KKS Trade Lands.

As a final comment, we note that in your letter of January 10, 2023, you state that the ALC has not made a final decision regarding the Proposed Inclusion. This is irrelevant to the ALC's constitutional obligations to KKS. The ALC has made a myriad of decisions related to the

Proposed Inclusion which amount to an ongoing breach of the ALC's duty to consult and accommodate KKS. The duty to consult entitles First Nations to a meaningful and fair *process*. The ALC's process with respect to the Proposed Inclusion to-date has been a stark and disconcerting example of a top-down, pre-determined undertaking which directly undermines the Province of British Columbia's commitment to reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples and amounts to a breach of the honour of the Crown.

V. ALC Interference in Federal Crown-Indigenous Negotiations

As you are aware, Canada and KKS have been engaged in a multi-year negotiation process with respect to the KKS Trade Lands. The parties have made significant progress in their negotiations, including the development and review of multiple research studies and the co-creation of a novel and viable path forward with respect to the KKS Trade Lands that will make attempts to satisfy all stakeholders.

KKS would like to offer the ALC an opportunity to learn more about KKS's proposed use of the KKS Trade Lands. KKS believes that the ALC would benefit from seeing the scope of the work that has already taken place between KKS and Canada and witnessing how close the parties are to concluding a just and reconciliatory agreement regarding the KKS Trade Lands.

KKS would be pleased to share this information with the ALC, however, we would require a standard Non-Disclosure Agreement given the sensitive and confidential nature of the negotiation details.

We believe that approaching this matter in a respectful, government-to-government manner between Canada, KKS, and the ALC (as an agent of the Province), may bring this process into greater alignment with the Province's commitment to reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples and the honour of the Crown.

VI. Conclusion

You have now been put on notice of the ALC's lack of jurisdiction to designate the KKS Trade Lands as ALR land, and the ALC's failure to fulfill its constitutional obligation to consult and accommodate KKS with respect to the Proposed Inclusion, on multiple occasions.

If you continue to advance the Proposed Inclusion process without the proper authority and without engaging in a meaningful consultation process with KKS we will be forced to pursue all necessary means to protect our inherent and constitutionally protected rights in the KKS Trade Lands.

We wish to note that the ALC's unilateral imposition of deadlines regarding the Proposed Inclusion, including the March 6, 2023, deadline to provide written submissions, is entirely at odds with the ALC's constitutional obligations to KKS as outlined throughout this letter. The ALC's recent correspondence to KKS where the ALC indicates it is "willing to consider" extending the March 6, 2023, submission deadline similarly demonstrates a fundamental misunderstanding of the collaborative and mutually respectful process required by the duty to consult.

In closing, we remind you that Canadian courts have confirmed that First Nations require sufficient expertise and resources to participate meaningfully in consultation, and that appropriate funding is essential to ensure a fair and balanced consultation process and level playing field between First Nations and the Crown. Accordingly, it is incumbent upon the ALC to provide sufficient funding to facilitate KKS's meaningful participation in the consultation process.

We trust you will take no further steps in the Proposed Inclusion process until we are provided sufficient capacity funding to enable our meaningful participation in consultations in respect of the same.

Please contact us immediately to arrange a time to meet to discuss how the ALC intends to fulfill its obligations to KKS and remain within the jurisdictional bounds of its designation authority. As a first step, we reiterate our offer to share information related to KKS's intended use of the KKS Trade Lands in an effort to educate the ALC regarding the gravity of what is at stake in this critical matter.

RECOMMENDATION

The Planning & Development Department and the Investment & Intergovernmental Relations Department recommend that Council:

- Provide staff with direction to proceed with:
 - a. Option 1, that the City supports the addition of the currently farmed portion of the lands included in the Agricultural Land Commission's proposal into the Agricultural Land Reserve, as outlined in this report and related map; or
 - b. Option 2, that the City does not support the Agricultural Land Commission proposal to have Federally Owned Lands added into the Agricultural Land Reserve, as outlined in this report; or
 - c. Option 3, that the City request the Agricultural Land Commission withdraw their current proposal with the intention of reviewing the use of these lands at a later date; and
- 2. Direct the City Clerk to forward a copy this report, along with the related Council Resolution, to the Agricultural Land Commission as the City's written comments to their Inclusion Proposal prior to their extended deadline for comments of February 15, 2023.

INTENT

The intent of this report is to obtain Council's direction from a series of options, as described in Appendix "I", in response to a December 15, 2022 letter from the Agricultural Land Commission ("ALC"), attached as Appendix "II", proposing to include 123 ha (304 ac) of federally owned lands within the City of Surrey into the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve ("ALR"). This report also provides background information and options for Council's consideration and requests that the

related Council Resolution be provided to the ALC as written comments on the matter prior to their February 15, 2023 extended deadline for comments.

BACKGROUND

Under s. 17(1) of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* ("the Act"), the ALC, on its own initiative, has applied for the inclusion of approximately 123 ha (~305 ac) of federally owned lands in Surrey, within North Campbell Heights Local Area Plan ("LAP") into the ALR, as illustrated in Appendix "II". The inclusion proposal ("the Proposal") includes five separate properties.

A summary of the proposed inclusion property addresses, uses, land use designations, and zones as well as previous motions by the City and Metro Vancouver related to the federally owned lands is provided in Appendix "III".

In accordance with s. 17(2) of the Act, the ALC held a public hearing. The City requested and was granted an extension to provide written comments, until February 15, 2023.

DISCUSSION

Given the intent of ALC to include the properties into the ALR, it is recommended that Council provide written direction to the Province on behalf of the City. Accordingly, staff have prepared the following options to consider in forming the City's response:

- Option 1, to support the addition of the currently farmed portion of the lands in the ALC Proposal into the ALR; or
- 2. Option 2, to not support the ALC Proposal to have the lands added into the ALR; or
- Option 3, to request the ALC withdraw their current proposal with the intention of reviewing the use of these lands at a later date.

A summary of each option is provided in Appendix "I".

CONCLUSION

This report provides background information to Council on a proposed ALR Inclusion of Federal Lands in the City of Surrey by the ALC, and options for Council to provide written comments on the matter in advance of an extended deadline to provide comments of February 15, 2023.

Option 1: To Support the addition of the currently farmed portion of the lands in the ALC Proposal into the ALR

There are currently 9,275 ha (22,919 ac) of ALR land in Surrey, which was established by the Province in 1973. If the Proposal properties of 123 ha (303 ac) are added into the ALR, it will increase the total ALR lands in Surrey by 1.3%, as identified in Schedule "B".

Protection of Farmland

Information from the ALC indicates that, according to the BCLI Land Capability Classification for Agriculture, 112.8 ha of the Proposal properties are considered to have prime agricultural capability due to a soil classification which allows for production of a wide range of crops with no major difficulties in management. The remainder 10.7 ha is a combination of soil types with varying subclasses.

The ALC also indicates that the majority of the Proposal properties have been leased to local producers for agricultural uses dating back to the 1970s, and approximately 89 ha of land are currently cultivated with field vegetable crops. Given the longstanding agricultural use and productivity of the subject properties, the ALC considers the lands suitable for inclusion in the ALR.

From an economic standpoint, Surrey's farmers support over 3,300 jobs and produce over \$167 million in sales (2013). In addition to the part-time seasonal workers, there are farm manager positions for each site, as well as jobs created indirectly through transportation, processing, and retail.

Potential Loss of Campbell Heights DCCs

Removing these identified lands from the Campbell Heights Land Use Plan will result in an estimated \$53 million shortfall in Campbell Heights DCCs, resulting in inadequate funds to complete infrastructure upgrades.

Potential Loss of Future Property Tax Revenue

If these properties become a part of the ALR versus if these properties were to be zoned as Business Park resulting in a Class 6 (Business & Other) classification assigned by British Columbia Assessment, the potential municipal tax revenue loss is \$4.0M based on 2022 land assessments.

Potential Loss of BCS Lands

The Proposal properties includes 34 hectares of intact forested land which has been identified as providing moderate to high ecological value as part of the GIN in Surrey's BCS, as illustrated in Schedule "C". Should the Proposal properties be added to the ALR, they would be governed under the Farm Practices Protection (Right to Farm) Act. This legislation allows for all or portions of the existing forested area on the property to be cleared for farming purposes, as the Farm Practices Protection (Right to Farm) Act ensures that a farmer is not prevented from conducting normal farming practices as part of their farm operation. There may, however, be limitations to the extent of removal of any environmentally sensitive assets based on the presence of regulated

watercourses and wildlife as well as federally regulated species at risk, or a future farm plate or agricultural buildings.

Given the above, as an alternative to adding all of the lands in the ALC Proposal, Option 1 recommends that only the actively farmed portions of the lands be added to the ALR, as illustrated in Schedule "C".

Option 2: To Not Support the ALC Proposal

The Proposal properties have been designated and anticipated for industrial use since 1966 when the Surrey Official Community Plan By-law No. 2465 was adopted, and the Proposal properties were not identified as lands to be added to the ALR in 1973. The Campbell Heights Land Use Plan, approved by Council in 2000, designated the Proposal properties as Business or Technology Park.

Pressure on Regional Industrial Land Supply

According to the Metro Vancouver Industrial and Mixed Employment Land Policy review, industrial lands, while comprising only 4% of this region's land base, accommodate over one-quarter of total employment, and contribute to the region's economic well-being, along with connections to transportation, trade, and government tax revenues. Metro Vancouver's Regional Industrial Lands Strategy documents the extremely limited supply of industrial lands in the region, the consistently strong demand for industrial space, and the few opportunities to add more industrial lands to the regional market. In many areas, existing industrial lands are also being threatened by conversion to other uses.

There are currently 4,030 ha (9,958 ac) of Mixed Employment designated lands identified in the OCP (as generally identified in Schedule "D"), with 658 ha (1,627 ac) within the Campbell Heights Land Use Plan area. Lands in the Campbells Heights Land Use Plan area are nearing development capacity, with only 313 ha (775 ac) remaining undeveloped. If the Proposal properties were removed from the Business/Technology Park designation, it would reduce the vacant employment land supply in the Plan area to 190 ha (470 ac). Based on current absorption rates, the remaining capacity would be built out by 2029.

Future Land Capacity for Farming vs. Industrial Uses

Surrey's ALR lands (9,275 ha) form a larger land base area than industrial land area (4,030 ha). While each use requires differing land area for production, there is a significant difference between the land available for future use for farming than for industrial.

Approximately 30% of Surrey's land base, 9,275 ha (22,919 ac) is currently within the ALR. According to the 2016 BC Land Use Inventory ("BCLUI"), 57% of Surrey's ALR lands are actively farmed, 24% are natural or semi-natural, and 19% are inactively farmed or not farmed. This leaves approximately 1,700 ha (4,200 ac) of unconstrained land that is not actively farmed in the ALR available for future farming.

In comparison, 4,030 ha (9,958 ac) of land is designated for Mixed Employment and Industrial in the OCP, with most of this land being largely developed. According to a 2016 Industrial Land

Supply Analysis report conducted by Colliers, there are only 432 ha (1,069 ac) of industrial land that is unconstrained and vacant in Surrey. With South Campbell Heights lands being added to the inventory, the total supply of land potentially for industrial development in Surrey is estimated at 622 ha (1,537 ac).

Across the region, the demand for industrial land continues to outpace supply, as there are few alternative employment lands available within the Urban Containment Boundary ("UCB"). In the absence of additional land to meet continued demand, the region is anticipated to absorb all effective supply sometime between 2028 and 2035.

Protection of BCS Lands

The Proposal properties includes 34 ha of intact forested land which has been identified as providing moderate to high ecological value as part of the GIN in Surrey's BCS. Should the Proposal properties remain outside of the ALR, the City will be able to ensure that the ecological value of these lands are protected as part of any future development application.

Option 3: To request the ALC withdraw their current proposal with the intention of reviewing the use of these lands at a later date

As discussed above, farming uses have occurred on a portion of the Proposal properties while they have been outside of the ALR but zoned as A-1 - General Agriculture. Also as discussed above, the inclusion of the any lands in the ALR does not ensure that the lands are actively farmed, as currently 1,700 ha of lands in the City in the ALR are not actively being farmed. Furthermore, the inclusion of the lands in the ALR could result in a loss of the 34 ha of intact forested land which has been identified as providing moderate to high ecological value as part of the GIN in Surrey's BCS.

In addition, the City has been advised by the Katzie, Kwantlen, and Semiahmoo First Nations that they have been engaging with the Federal Government on the future of Proposal properties. The Katzie, Kwantlen, and Semiahmoo First Nations have expressed concern that the addition of these lands to the ALR could frustrate their discussions with the Federal Government. Staff have not been advised when these discussions are expected to conclude.

Given the above, Council could direct staff to request the ALC withdraw their current proposal with the intention of reviewing the lands at a later date.


Schedule "B" Current ALR Lands in Context to Proposed Inclusion Area



Overview

The Agricultural Land Commission (the "Commission" or "ALC"), acting under s. 17(1) of the Agricultural Land Commission Act (ALCA), is initiating a proposal to include 123.6 ha (~305 acres) of land within the City of Surrey into the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) (the "Proposal"). The subject land is comprised of five contiguous parcels described in Table 1 and shown on Attachments A-C (the "Properties" or the "Lands"):

The Properties are owned by the Government of Canada and were historically held for Federal communication purposes. The Properties have been concurrently leased to local producers for agricultural use dating back to the 1970s, and approximately 89 ha (220 acres) of the subject Lands are currently cultivated with field vegetable crops.

The Government of Canada has determined that the Properties are surplus to its needs and, in 2017, initiated a process to dispose of the Properties in accordance with Federal disposition procedures. The potential sale of the Properties by the Government of Canada to another agency or owner may render the Properties vulnerable to future changes in land use, as local land use plans contemplate Mixed Employment development on the Properties.

Given the longstanding agricultural use and productivity of the Properties, the Commission considers that the Lands may be suitable for inclusion in the ALR. Land within the ALR is subject to Provincial legislation (the ALCA and ALR regulations) which permits and protects agricultural use of ALR land while restricting non-farm uses or subdivision unless approved by the Commission. The ALR designation would support in preserving the Properties' continued agricultural use.

Site Context & Characteristics

The Properties are located in the Campbell Heights area of the City of Surrey, bounded by 192 St (west), 32 Ave (south), and the Township of Langley municipal boundary (east).

The surrounding land use is comprised of residential development (east), the Campbell Heights Business Park (south and west), and non-ALR residential acreages (west). The subject Lands border private ALR lands to the north, and if designated as ALR, would adjoin the large, contiguous ALR block within the City of Surrey.

Approximately 89 ha (220 acres) of the Lands is cleared and currently cultivated while the remaining ~34 ha (~84 acres) along the north and east boundary is forested. The Lands are generally flat with the exception of steep slopes in the northeast corner where Anderson Creek

bisects the Lands, and gentler slopes in the northwest within the forested area.

Agricultural Capability

Based on the BC Land Inventory (BCLI), 'Land Capability Classification for Agriculture in B.C.' system, the improved agricultural capability ratings applicable to the Lands are Class 2, 3, 4, and 7¹; more specifically, as shown in **Table 2** and **Attachment D**, approximately 91% of the land (112.8 ha) is within a polygon rated as improvable to Class 2A (considered as having prime agricultural capability). Class 2 land is capable of producing a wide range of crops; minor soil restrictions may reduce capability but pose no major difficulties in management. The limiting subclass associated with this polygon is A (soil moisture deficiency).

The remaining 10.7 ha comprising the northern extent of the Lands is primarily a combination of Classes 2, 3, and 4 land with various limiting subclasses including A (soil moisture deficiency), D (undesirable soil structure), F (low fertility), T (topographic limitations), and W (excess water). A small portion of the Lands' northeast corner is within a polygon rated as Class 7T generally following Anderson Creek, and is considered unimprovable due to topographic limitations.

¹ Class 2 - land is capable of producing a wide range of crops. Minor restrictions of soil or climate may reduce capability but pose no major difficulties in management.

Class 3 - land is capable of producing a fairly wide range of crops under good management practices. Soil and or climate limitations are somewhat restrictive.

Class 4 - land is capable of a restricted range of crops. Soil and climate conditions require special management considerations.

Class 5 - land is capable of production of cultivated perennial forage crops and specially adapted crops. Soil and/or climate conditions severely limit capability.

Class 7 - land has no capability for soil bound agriculture.

The BCLI Agricultural Capability classification system is further explained on the Soils and Agricultural Capability page of the ALC website.

Local Government Zoning and Land Use Designations

While the Properties are currently zoned for agricultural use under City of Surrey Zoning Bylaw No. 12000, local and regional land use plans contemplate future Mixed Employment uses on the Properties (i.e. Business or Technology Park), similar in nature to adjacent lands to the southwest in the Campbell Heights Business Park area (**Table 3**). In July 2022, City of Surrey Council expressed support for redesignating the Properties as 'Agricultural' as part of the City's Official Community Plan review process taking place in 2023.

The proposed inclusion may have implications on the Properties' future land use, as the Provincial ALCA takes precedence over (but does not replace) local and regional land use regulations. Though the Properties are designated for future Mixed Employment use in local land use plans, non-agricultural uses such as Business Park development etc. would not be permitted without Commission approval if the Properties are designated as ALR.

ALC Policy & Procedures

The Proposal is being initiated under s. 17(1) of the ALCA, which states that the Commission, on its own initiative, may approve the inclusion of land in the ALR if the Commission considers that the approval carries out the intent of the ALCA. Additionally, s. 15(1) of the ALCA states that the Commission may designate land, including Crown land, as ALR land for the purposes of s. 6 of the ALCA, if the Commission is satisfied that the land is suitable for farm use.


In accordance with s. 17(2) of the ALCA, the Commission will hold a Public Hearing to afford interested parties an opportunity to be heard on matters related to the Proposal. A report of the Public Hearing and all written submissions received in advance of the Public Hearing will be compiled and provided to the Commissioners for review. Additional procedural requirements for Commission-initiated inclusion proposals are set out in ss. 15 and 17 of the ALR General Regulation, BC Reg. 149/2020.


In making a determination on the matter, the Commission will consider the Proposal and the Public Hearing feedback in the context of the Commission's purposes and priorities set out in s. 6 of the ALCA:


- 6 (1) The following are the purposes of the commission:
 - (a) to preserve the agricultural land reserve;
 - (b) to encourage farming of land within the agricultural land reserve in collaboration with other communities of interest; and,
 - (c) to encourage local governments, first nations, the government and its agents to enable and accommodate farm use of land within the agricultural land reserve and uses compatible with agriculture in their plans, bylaws and policies.
- (2) The commission, to fulfill its purposes under subsection (1), must give priority to protecting and enhancing all of the following in exercising its powers and performing its duties under this Act:
 - (a) the size, integrity and continuity of the land base of the agricultural land reserve;
 - (b) the use of the agricultural land reserve for farm use.











Proposed Inclusion Area - Context Map





Planning & Development Department The five properties are currently designated Mixed Employment in the Regional Growth Strategy ("the RGS"), designated "Mixed Employment" in Surrey Official Community Plan Bylaw, No. 18020 ("the OCP"), and are zoned A-1 General Agriculture in Surrey Zoning By-law, 1993, No. 12000 ("the Zoning By-law").

The five properties in the Proposal are bounded by 192 Street to the west, 32 Avenue to the south, and the Township of Langley municipal boundary to the east. While the properties are designated Technology Park or Business Park in the Campbell Heights LAP, approximately 89 ha (220 ac) of the lands are currently cultivated with field vegetable crops, with the remaining 34 ha (84 ac) along the north and east boundary being forested.

The Proposal, as put forward, requests inclusion of the entire 123 ha of the federally owned properties into the ALR. While 89 ha of the land is currently productive farmland with high value soil, there is also 34 ha of intact forested land which has been identified as providing moderate to high ecological value as part of the Green Infrastructure Network ("GIN") in Surrey's Biodiversity Conservation Strategy ("BCS"), specifically Biodiversity Hub B and Connectivity Corridor 59.

The Proposal properties are owned by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada ("ISED"), a department of the Federal Government responsible for improving conditions for investment and expanding Canada's role in global trade. The Proposal properties are currently under a federal disposition process.

According to a Metro Vancouver staff report titled "Federally-owned Farmland in Surrey", a copy of which is attached as Schedule "A", a large portion of the Proposal properties have been leased to, and farmed by, the same family for approximately 50 years. Over that time, the ISED had not considered a change in land use to support other economic development purposes and, therefore, the long-standing lease for the farming operation remained in place. In 2017, ISED determined the land was no longer required for federal purposes and at that time began a disposition process, which is established by the Treasury Board through the Directive on the Management of Real Property.

The Metro Vancouver report also notes that over the past year Public Services and Procurement Canada ("PSPC"), the federal department working on behalf of ISED to manage the land disposition, compiled the required resources and reviews for the Proposal properties and anticipates being able to post a request for a Notice of Expression of Interest ("EOI") in the properties in the near future. The PSPC indicated that the ISED has requested that the solicitation of an EOI be deferred to provide local First Nations additional time to review information they have been provided by PSPC and to allow additional time to examine the potential implications and to assess appropriate next steps related to the recent intent by the ALC to include these properties within the ALR.

At the July 11, 2022 Regular Council Public hearing Meeting, Council passed a Notice of Motion pertaining to the review of the Proposal properties as part of the OCP process and to support the Federal and Provincial Governments to move towards including these lands into the ALR as follows:

That:

- The 220 ac of exceptionally fertile farmland located at 192nd Street and 36th Avenue and currently zoned Agricultural (A-1), be designated as Agricultural as part of the Official Community Plan review process taking place in 2023;
- 2. The City work with the Federal and Provincial governments to move towards bringing these lands into the Agriculture Land Reserve; and
- Staff conduct an assessment of all agricultural, food producing land in Surrey with a view to protecting these lands for the purpose of addressing future food security requirements.

At the October 28, 2022 Metro Vancouver Board Meeting, it was noted that the long term protection of the Proposal properties for agricultural purposes would be best achieved under public inclusion into the ALR and being designated Agricultural by the RGS and the OCP. The Metro Vancouver Board made the following motion:

That the MVRD Board Coordinate with the City of Surrey in supporting a re-designation for the Heppell property (federally-owned land leased by the Heppell Family) as part of the OCP amendment process to preserve it for agricultural uses.

RECOMMENDATION

That the MVRD Board receive for information the report dated September 26, 2022, titled "Federally-Owned Farmland in Surrey".

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On September 8, 2022, members of Metro Vancouver's Agricultural Advisory Committee presented to the Regional Planning Committee asking for Metro Vancouver to support the protection of a five-parcel, 120-hectare site in Surrey for continued agriculture production. The properties are currently designated Mixed Employment in the Regional Growth Strategy, designated "Mixed Employment" in Surrey's Official Community Plan and are zoned General Agriculture (A-1); they are federally-owned, and are currently under a Federal disposition process. This process requires the Federal government to consider a range of obligations that are not publicized, including determining any asserted or established Aboriginal or treaty rights.

Given that the properties are owned by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, a department of the Federal Government focused on national economic development and trade, the long-term protection of the properties for agricultural purposes would be best achieved under municipal or provincial ownership, being included into the Agricultural Land Reserve, and being designated Agriculture by the regional growth strategy and Surrey's Official Community Plan.

Changing the property's designation to "Agriculture" as part of the City's OCP update process and including them into the Agricultural Land Reserve has been supported by a Surrey City Council resolution. This report is being provided to the Committee in response to questions asked at the September meeting and to requests for additional information.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide additional information regarding the federally-owned farmland also known as Heppell's farm, located between 36 and 44 Avenues along 192 and 196 Streets in the City of Surrey and the Federal Government's disposition process for the lands.

BACKGROUND


On September 8, 2022 the Regional Planning Committee received an invited presentation from two members of the Metro Vancouver Agricultural Advisory Committee (AAC) where they presented a memo (Reference 1) identifying concern over the potential loss of a large, 120-hectare federally-owned parcel of farmland in Surrey. The AAC members requested that the Regional Planning Committee assist in ensuring these properties are not lost from agricultural production. Regional

Planning staff were requested by the Committee to report back with more information on the status of the federal land disposition process as well as the jurisdictional authority over the lands.

PROPERTY DETAILS

Approximately one third of the City of Surrey falls within the Agricultural Land Reserve, a provincial designation established in 1973 with the intent of prioritizing agriculture and protecting the most fertile farm lands throughout the province. Several properties located between 192 Street and 196 Street and between 36 Avenue and 44 Avenue in Surrey, also known as Heppell's Farm, were not included in the Agricultural Land Reserve when it was first created, but have been actively farmed since that time, producing a sizeable portion of fresh vegetables that serve regional, provincial and national markets (Figure 1).

Figure1: Subject Properties




During the preparation of *Metro Vancouver 2040: Shaping our Future*, the regional growth strategy, the subject properties were designated Mixed Employment to align with Surrey's Official Community Plan (OCP) (Figure 2). In Surrey's OCP, adopted in October 2014, the properties are designated Mixed Employment, which was derived from the Campbell Heights Land Use Plan completed in 2000, identifying the properties as "Technology Park or Business Park" (Figure 3).

PROPERTY OWNERSHIP AND DISPOSITION PROCESS

The subject properties have been leased to, and farmed by, the same family for approximately 50 years. The 120-hectare site and all five properties within it are owned by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), a department of the Federal Government responsible for improving conditions for investment and expanding Canada's role in global trade. Over that time, the ISED had not considered a change in land use to support other economic development purposes and therefore the long-standing lease for the farming operation remained in place. In 2017, ISED determined the land was no longer required for federal purposes and at that time began a disposition process, which is established by the Treasury Board through the Directive on the Management of Real Property (Reference 2).

This Directive sets out the due diligence for federal property disposition which includes determining the following components:

- · title to the land;
- · environmental conditions;
- physical performance;
- heritage value or archaeology sites;
- · security conditions; and
- market value and appraisals.

Over the past year, Public Services and Procurement Canada, the federal department working on behalf of ISED to manage the land disposition, compiled the required resources and reviews for the subject properties and now anticipates being able to post a request for a Notice of Expression of Interest in the properties before the end of 2022. These Notices are sent to all levels of government, including First Nations, and are open for 30 days. Priority for considering interest in acquiring federally-owned lands is reviewed in the following order:

- federal departments;
- crown corporations;
- provinces; and
- municipalities and Indigenous groups.

Any submissions made as part of that Expression of Interest must include an identified public purpose for the future use of the lands. This process is intended to be open and transparent and based on the determined market value of the properties.

CITY OF SURREY'S POSITION

The subject properties have been in the media for several months after a petition was launched by a City of Surrey citizen seeking support to keep the properties in agricultural production (Reference 3). The petition's signatories are asking the Federal Government to continue to lease the land for farming purposes, and to work with the Province to include the parcels within the ALR. The petition also asked the City of Surrey to adjust its OCP to ensure that the land is retained over the long term for agricultural use.

As noted at the Regional Planning Committee on September 8, 2022, on July 11, 2022 the City of Surrey demonstrated support for the continued use of the land for agricultural purposes by passing a Council resolution that states:

- The 220 acres of exceptionally fertile farmland located at 192nd Street and 36th
 Avenue and currently zoned Agricultural (A-1), be designated as Agricultural as
 part of the Official Community Plan review process taking place in 2023;
- The City work with the Federal and Provincial governments to move towards bringing these lands into the Agriculture Land Reserve; and
- Staff conduct an assessment of all agricultural, food producing land in Surrey with a view to protecting these lands for the purpose of addressing future food security requirements.

The City is in the early stages of updating its OCP and while the timeline for the update has not been released, depending on the scope of the OCP review, could take several years to complete. Updating the OCP will also necessitate an application to Metro Vancouver to amend the regional land use designation for the site.

JURISDICTION AND AUTHORITY

Managing the jurisdictions and authorities for decision making for the subject properties is complicated and involves several levels of government. References have been made to the Agricultural Land Reserve and the City's OCP land use designations as possible methods to ensure the long-term protection of the land for agricultural purposes, but the ownership of the lands is a critically important factor.

Federal Authority

Canada's constitutional structure establishes the authority of the Federal Government over that of all lower-tier governments. Under Federal ownership, the inclusion of the subject properties into the Agricultural Land Reserve under Provincial legislation, or the re-designation of the lands in the City's OCP from "Mixed Employment" to "Agricultural" would not supersede Federal jurisdiction over the preferred use of the lands. While for the most part federal departments work to comply with local land use policies and regulations, conflicts over use have been upheld in court in favour of federal interests, even in cases where properties are occupied by a tenant or not used for Federal Government purposes.

City Jurisdiction

While uses on federally-owned lands are ultimately at the discretion of the Federal Government, a local government can indicate its intent and support for land uses through OCP land use designations and zoning. In this instance, the subject property is already zoned General Agriculture (A-1) by the City of Surrey's Zoning Bylaw, No. 12000 and, as noted above, the City has passed a resolution indicating support for changing the OCP land use designation of the properties from "Mixed Employment" to "Agricultural" during its upcoming OCP update process. While the OCP process could take several years to complete, and given that the Federal Government is planning to post its request for Expressions of Interest in the coming months, as the authority over its OCP land use designations, the City has the option to amend the subject property's land use designation at any time prior to or during its OCP update. This would make the City's desired land use direction for the properties clear

and illustrate its commitment to retaining the agricultural use and to pursuing an Agricultural Land Reserve inclusion application to any potential purchasers of the lands before the Federal Government disposes of them.

Metro Vancouver Jurisdiction

An additional related land use policy that has not yet been discussed is the role of the regional growth strategy in the protection of these lands. Should the MVRD Board determine that there is a regional interest in the long-term protection of these lands for agricultural purposes, and to support the City of Surrey's interest in re-designating the lands to "Agricultural" and bringing them into the Agriculture Land Reserve, an amendment to the regional growth strategy can be initiated at any time to amend the regional land use in *Metro 2040* from "Mixed Employment" ("Employment" in *Metro 2050*) to "Agricultural". Such an amendment would better support the City's application to expand the Agricultural Land Reserve and it will be made clear to all parties interested in the possible purchase of the lands, as well as those involved in the City's OCP update, that the OCP land use change is being done to not only protect the continued agricultural use of the lands, but also to be consistent with the regional land use designation.

Should a non-government entity succeed at purchasing the properties, they would be required to comply with all applicable Provincial, regional, and local policies and regulations.

LONG-TERM AGRICULTURAL PROTECTION

Options for long-term agricultural protection of the subject properties will depend on the direction of the Federal Government and the outcome of the current land disposition process. Because the disposition of federal lands follows procedures established by a Directive under the authority of the federal *Financial Administration Act*, it cannot be circumvented nor adjusted by a lower-tier government; however, the Province, the City, and Metro Vancouver could submit expressions of interest for the retention of the lands for the public purpose of food production over the long term.

ALTERNATIVES

This is an information report. No alternatives are presented.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications to this report.

CONCLUSION

A five-parcel 120-hectare piece of active farmland located in Surrey is owned by the Federal Government and is part of a current land disposition process. Many citizens, the farming community and the City of Surrey have expressed interest in retaining the properties for farming use. While amendments to the regional growth strategy and the City of Surrey's OCP and inclusion into the Agricultural Land Reserve can happen at any time, as long as the property is Federally-owned, the Federal Government's constitutional jurisdiction can override that of a lower-tier government. Long-term protection of these properties for agricultural purposes would be best achieved under public inclusion into the Agricultural Land Reserve, and being designated Agricultural by the regional growth strategy and the City's Official Community Plan as soon as possible.

We write in response your letter to Public Services and Procurement Canada of November 9, 2022 where you advised that the Agricultural Land Commission ("ALC") has resolved to initiate a proposal pursuant to section 17(1)(a) of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (*ALCA*) to include the above noted lands into the Agricultural Land Reserve ("ALR").

A disposal process has begun in relation to these lands. As part of this process, consultations with the Katzie, Kwantlen and Semiahmoo First Nations have been ongoing.

These lands are owned by His Majesty the King in right of Canada as represented by ISED ("Canada") and therefore are not subject to the jurisdiction of the *ALCA*. Federal real property is immune from the application of provincial laws that relate to the use of the property (s. 91(1A) of the *Constitution Act, 1867*). For this reason, the BC Agricultural Land Commission has no authority to include these lands in the ALR, and such an inclusion would have no effect on Canada's future use of the lands.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide a statement of support for protecting farmland and prioritizing a resilient food supply in Western Canada.

BC Agriculture Council (BCAC) is the lead industry advocate for key sector-wide priorities in British Columbia (B.C.). We deliver the collective voice for the sector through our 28 unique commodity associations that we represent. In turn, **our member associations represent approximately 96%** of provincial farm gate sales in B.C.

Protecting productive farmland is vital to the future success and sustainability of agriculture in British Columbia (B.C.). Without land dedicated to agricultural production in the province, it will be difficult to ensure access to safe, affordable food for British Columbians.

It is apparent that the subject land in Surrey, B.C., is unique and some of Canada's best farmland in the country. Farmed by Heppell's Potatoes for more than three generations, the potential threat of this land being included in the Campbell Heights Industry Plan for development is deeply concerning. Most immediately, we would like to express our support to protect this farmland by halting any such plans for development and allowing it to be placed in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

When agricultural land is lost to development, it is never recovered. The potential loss of this area would equal a clear deterioration of regional food security in Canada and the resilience of Western Canada's food system.

Adding onto this, this land provides consistency to regional food supply through its natural features. After heavy rains, harvesting activities are impossible in other early fields in B.C. Yet, due to the land's exceptional drainage capacity, our food security can rely on this land to maintain supply. The 2021 flooding event in the Sumas Prairie highlights the importance of resilient agricultural production in this province, where ongoing infrastructure bottlenecks can make access to fresh produce a challenge in the midst of extreme weather events and disaster conditions.

BCAC fully supports the efforts to see this vital piece of productive farmland recognized as part of the Agricultural Land Reserve.

Madame Chair and Commissioners

Thank you for the opportunity to speak today on the future of the lands located at 3884-192nd Street in Surrey.

My name is Murray Driediger and I am the President and CEO of BC Fresh.

BC Fresh is 100% owned by 31 BC farm families located throughout the lower mainland. In addition to these 31 shareholders, we also market the produce from another 30 farm families located locally. We are the largest marketer of BC grown potatoes and vegetables.

We sell and distribute approximately 200,000,000 lbs. of produce annually. The majority of which, is grown within a few kilometers of where we are meeting today.

For the past 30-years, we have been selling the produce that have been grown on these lands and are in a unique position to attest to their value to our local food supply.

BC Fresh is a significant part of the food supply chain in BC, with sales and marketing programs in place with every major national retailer, food service company, and wholesaler operating in Western Canada.

I would first like to speak to some big picture issues so we can put the importance of these lands in perspective.

There is a lot of public discussion in today's world regarding the term, food security. Our company is on the front lines of this challenge and we deal with it daily. There was a time when land in BC was plentiful and crop rotation was not an issue. Weather and crop productivity was more reliable, and produce from competing regions was available year around. All within a 48-hour delivery window of the BC market.

That is no longer the case.

The world's population, along with our local population, has continued to grow. At the same time, farmland around the world is being lost at alarming levels. California has been our supplier when BC is out of season and it is clear, we can no longer rely on them as we have in the past. Climate change and other world events are wreaking havoc on the food chain supply. These are not just news headlines that we are reading daily, and are becoming immune to.

These events now affect the very supply that you have come to expect when you shop in your local super market. It is affecting us daily. It is very real and it is driving enormous costs into the food supply chain that is impacting consumers budgets. We need to wake up.

Local land prices have been driven up by investors, speculators and developers, making it beyond the reach of economic food production. Our growers are now buying and leasing land, and producing crops in communities like Kamloops, Cache Creek, and the Okanagan because there is insufficient land available in the lower mainland.

We now grow and ship crops from 200 to 400 kilometers away and transport them back to the lower mainland to augment our supply. But suitable land supply in these other areas is also limited.

This brings us to the lands at the core of the discussion today.

While there is a shortage of farmland in BC that is capable of producing outdoor crops economically, there is a severe shortage of land that can produce reliably when faced with a changing climate. The well-drained, sandy loam soils on 192nd can produce most outdoor vegetable crops for almost 10-months of the year. This is very rare land that annually produces enough early crops to supply the BC and western Canadian market for many commodities and reduce our reliance on imports. Its importance to the local food supply is essential.

When the severe rains in September 2010 wiped out production throughout the lower mainland, we were able to continue harvesting on these lands.

When the Sumas floods wiped out the production from Abbotsford to Chilliwack in 2021, we were able to continue harvesting on these lands.

No one will argue with developers that there is a shortage of land for warehouses. We are well aware of that and take no issue with their argument. If these lands are allowed to be taken out of food production, within a few short years they will be paved over and lost forever. The same developers will then move onto their next projects. This is what they do and they are a valuable part of our economy.

But surely, there is enough collective wisdom and political will left in this province to protect our most valuable farmland and find other unproductive lands on which to construct warehousing and homes. You cannot simply compare the value of agriculture land against the high dollar value of warehouse-zoned property.

You cannot put a value on this parcel of land when it comes to food security in BC. It is priceless.

Removing this parcel of highly productive farmland from agriculture production would be a complete travesty. To do so would be short sighted and it will cause irreparable damage to local food security and the supply of farmland in BC. There have been far too many parcels like this location that have been permanently destroyed to accommodate industrial, commercial, and residential interests.

With droughts, heat domes, floods, and climate change creating havoc throughout the food supply chain in North America, we must do everything we can to secure our highly productive local farmlands.

BC's ongoing reliance on food supply from production areas like California is a dangerous bet as they continue to struggle with an array of production issues and limitations. They too, are losing land and farming operations at an alarming rate.

We must start thinking long-term about our own food security and resist the temptation to remove one more highly valuable piece of farmland.

BC Fresh strongly supports maintaining this unique farm land for agriculture so that fresh nutritious affordable produce can be grown for BC consumers. This land should be placed in the Agriculture Land Reserve and protected for generations to come.

3. Motion to Support Agricultural Land

WHEREAS

- Productive agricultural land is critical to ensuring a local, secure food system for our city;
- COVID food security challenges have highlighted the fragility of our bordercrossing food supply chains;
- Ensuring that Vancouver has a secure food supply is of critical importance to the City of Vancouver;
- The Federal Government owns 220 acres of land on 192nd street in Campbell Heights, Surrey BC (the "Campbell Heights Lands") which are not in the Provincial

- Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR), and are designated as "mixed employment" in the Metro Vancouver Regional Growth Strategy (RGS);
- 5. The Campbell Heights Lands are a critical piece of the region's food system and reduce reliance on food imports as they have been leased as farmland for over 100 years and are some of the most agriculturally productive in the region due to their sandy soil upon a level hill-top. These Lands never flood, can be planted or harvested on nearly any day of the year and have a special micro-climate suited for early crop production. An estimated 30-50 million servings of potatoes, carrots, cabbage, parsnips and squash are produced from the land annually, enough to put a vegetable serving on every Metro Vancouver resident's dinner plate for 2-3 weeks;
- The Federal Government plans to sell the Campbell Heights Lands, which could enable them to be redeveloped to non-farm uses by new owners because they are not protected for agriculture by the ALR or the RGS;
- In the face of climate change, agricultural land is at increasing risk due to flooding, fire, and other natural disasters, and;
- Over 68,000 people have signed a petition to protect this farmland as of 9/12/2022¹;
- 9. The Metro Vancouver Agricultural Advisory Board have:
 - a) Indicated "There is sincere regret that such a valuable piece of land could be lost to agriculture";
 - Requested that Metro Vancouver advocate to senior levels of government to protect the lands for agricultural use;
 - Suggested a swap be discussed for a parcel of land that would not result in an abrupt halt in food production";²
- 10. The City of Vancouver has a seat at the Metro Vancouver Regional Planning Council and can advocate for increased protection of this farmland:
- The City of Surrey supports maintaining this land as agricultural in nature.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- A. The Vancouver Food Policy Council recommends that the City of Vancouver advocate for amendments to the Metro Vancouver Regional Growth Strategy to designate the Campbell Heights Lands as Agricultural;
- B. The Vancouver Food Policy Council recommends that the City of Vancouver advocate to the City of Surrey and the Province of British Columbia to include the

Campbell Heights Lands within the Agricultural Land Reserve, or take other actions to ensure their agricultural nature is preserved;

C. The Vancouver Food Policy Council recommends the City of Vancouver advocate to the federal government to ensure that any disbursement of the Campbell Heights Lands ensures that their agricultural nature is preserved.

- The Greenest City Action Plan 2020 sets an ambitious target for the City of Vancouver to become the greenest city in the world by 2020;
- The City of Vancouver has committed to become a zero waste community, as outlined in the Zero Waste 2040 Strategy³ recommending to:
 - Support industry education strategies that increase waste diversion and circular practices, such as workshops, incentives, waste audits, tracking systems to monitor progress (1.2);
 - Establish clear measurement tools to audit and track waste reduction at city, business and resident level and enforce violations (5.7);
 - Review and update policies on zero waste infrastructure, facilities, technology and transportation systems, as well as measurement, tracking and benchmarking tools (5.8);
- 58% of food produced in Canada is wasted, and avoidable food waste is worth \$49 billion⁴:
- The United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal (UN SDG) 12.3 is to decrease food waste at the retail and consumer levels by 50% per capita by 2030⁵;
- According to the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), if food waste were a country, it would be the 3rd largest CO2 emitter, just after China and the USA,⁶ and ending food waste is understood as the single most powerful solution to mitigate the impacts of the climate crisis⁷;

This letter is to support the inclusion of the properties associated with ALC file 66884 to be included in the Agricultural Land Reserve and to protect these incredibly important and productive croplands into perpetuity given the ongoing and rampant expansion of industrial lands in this area.

Since adopted in 2011, MetroVancouver's 2040 regional growth strategy has documented a net loss of agricultural lands in the region. The inclusion of the properties identified in ALC File 66884 could provide nearly a 65% return on those losses over the last decade.

As per MetroVancouvers 2050 Vision, the protection of agricultural lands from land speculation and conversion of agricultural lands into urban use have been recognized as one of the key challenges in the long-term protection and resilience of food productions lands in the MetroVancouver region.

"The ongoing production of fresh and local food contributes to a secure food supply and economic resilience, and supports other co-benefits such as ecosystem services. Yet land speculation, the conflicts between urban and agricultural uses, and the conversion pressures from other land uses on agricultural lands continue to threaten the resilience of agriculture in the region. The impacts of climate change are also projected to have significant impacts on the agricultural industry. Effective growth management policy includes strategies to protect and enhance agricultural lands and support agricultural viability over the long-term... This [2050] strategy also seeks to protect Agricultural land for local food production and



supports the economic viability of the agricultural sector, while recognizing the value of ecosystem services" (MetroVancouver 2050).

Furthermore, the forested and riparian areas to the east and north of the sites provide a multitude of ecosystem services that have also been identified by MetroVancouver as being a key factor to climate adaptation into the future. The forested regions on the these properties have been identified by the City of Surrey as being part of their Green Infrastructure Areas and are included their Streamside Protection Areas.




Figure 2- Federally Identified Critical Habitat for Barn Owl (Tyto alba) less than 500m from subject properties.



I would like to emphasize that there is Federally Identified Critical Habitat for Barn Owl (Tyto alba) less than 500m to the west of this site which undoubtedly make use of these lands and, in turn, likely provide a natural predator control for farm operations on site.

I would further like to emphasize the role the subject properties played during the November 2021 flood events which allowed for the continued farming operations on site while the rest of the region was either inundated or fields too saturated to operate within. This highlights the need to secure highly productive lands that can provide for agricultural resilience in our increasingly stochastic and unpredictable climate futures.

I respectively request your offices consider both the unique agricultural opportunities and potential of these subject properties, but also the high ecological values and the natural capital assets held within them.

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Dear Minister Alexis and Ms. Grout:

On behalf of the Greater Vancouver Board of Trade (GVBOT) and our over 5,000 members, I am writing to express our concerns with the process of considering the inclusion of 123.6ha (~305) acres of land in the City of Surrey within the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). Given the multi-faceted and urgent land-use challenges facing our region, we are asking that the process be paused in order to accommodate a more fulsome and holistic conversation on the viewpoints and concerns of all impacted stakeholders.

We understand the importance of increasing the production of local foods and supporting the local agricultural sector. Climate change and the recent disruptions in supply chains are once again confirming that we need to ensure that we are increasing our food security. We believe that B.C. has significant potential to provide affordable and high-quality food for the province. At the same time, we believe that this goal should be approached from a holistic perspective, such as that offered in the Food Security Task Force Report, that takes into consideration the variety of factors that go

into food production. We also believe that these conversations need to be inclusive of the variety of competing land-use needs across the entire region.

Metro Vancouver and the Lower Mainland is geographically challenged by waterways, mountains, existing density, and an international border. We are facing an alarming and worsening housing availability and affordability crisis as well as a severe shortage of industrial land.

Industrial lands provide critical space for business operations like manufacturing and processing across a variety of sectors and play a critical role in our dynamic economy by supporting a prosperous workforce and trading relationships. On behalf of the Greater Vancouver Board of Trade (GVBOT) and our over 5,000 members, I am writing to express our concerns with the process of considering the inclusion of 123.6ha (~305) acres of land in the City of Surrey within the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). Given the multi-faceted and urgent land-use challenges facing our region, we are asking that the process be paused in order to accommodate a more fulsome and holistic conversation on the viewpoints and concerns of all impacted stakeholders.

We understand the importance of increasing the production of local foods and supporting the local agricultural sector. Climate change and the recent disruptions in supply chains are once again confirming that we need to ensure that we are increasing our food security. We believe that B.C. has significant potential to provide affordable and high-quality food for the province. At the same time, we believe that this goal should be approached from a holistic perspective, such as that offered in the Food Security Task Force Report, that takes into consideration the variety of factors that go into food production. Re: Surrey Board of Trade Support for the Proposed ALR Inclusion of Federal Lands in Surrey, British Columbia (192 Street and 36 Avenue)

The Surrey Board of Trade is contacting you about the following consideration by the Agricultural Land Commission and the public hearing taking place on the evening of January 23, 2023:

Acting under section 17(1) of the <u>Agricultural Land Commission Act</u> (ALCA), the Agricultural Land Commission is initiating a proposal to include 123.6 ha (~305 acres) of land within the City of Surrey into the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve. The subject land comprises five contiguous properties owned by the Government of Canada. Approximately 89 ha (~220 acres) of the lands are currently leased to local agricultural producers for field crop production. The Government of Canada is considering disposition of the properties, which may leave the lands vulnerable to future changes in land use. Given the longstanding agricultural use and productivity of the properties, the Commission considers that the lands may be suitable for inclusion to the ALR. The ALR designation would apply a layer of provincial land use legislation (the ALCA and ALR Regulations) to the lands to preserve their availability for current and future agricultural use.

SURREY BOARD OF TRADE PERSPECTIVE

The Surrey Board of Trade supports keeping the subject land at 192 Street and 36 Avenue for agricultural (food) production. While we are supportive of the need to intensify and create industrial lands (employment lands), we recognize and appreciate that at the same time we need to harness and sustain local food production. Given the unique nature of this piece of land, using it for anything other than agricultural purposes will be an economic and food security disaster for British Columbia.

- 1. The 89-hectare field at 192 Street and 36 Avenue is about two-thirds of a property owned by the Federal Government and has been leased by Surrey's Heppell's Potato Farm for the last 50 years. The land produces between 30 million and 50 million servings of vegetables each year, which in early spring and late fall are often the only locally grown field vegetables available in BC grocery stores.
- 2. The land is elevated and sandy. It drains very well, allowing farmers to plant and harvest when conditions are rainy and wet, giving residents and businesses the opportunities to enjoy produce when

other farms are not able to plant and harvest during the challenging seasons. The land has the right balance of sunshine, temperatures and drainage. Its hilltop location means the land is not vulnerable to flooding and less vulnerable to frost. It receives more sunshine and less rainfall than Abbotsford and Chilliwack and drains much better than low lying Surrey, Richmond and Delta soils.

- 3. During last year's abnormally cold and wet spring, Heppell's was able to plant and harvest potatoes before other farmers were able to get onto muddy fields to cultivate them. As a result, the field produced several crops of potatoes, about 70% of BC's domestic harvest from May to August 1, as well as the first local parsnips, carrots and cabbage. Climate change and supply chain issues challenge the availability of imported food. BC needs to protect its ability to feed itself.
- 4. The Surrey Board of Trade is supportive of Simon Fraser University's Agriculture Technology Innovation Centre. AgTech is an important economic priority for the BC Government to create jobs and enhance food security. Local farm and food production partnerships with economic drivers with universities are already occurring.
- 5. Agriculture lands are also employment lands. The overwhelming advantages of Surrey's farming industry make the economic potential lucrative, making it a future powerhouse in the national and global food market.
- 6. Indigenous dialogues have occurred and will continue to occur.

Canada is the fifth-largest food producer in the world. In 2021, the whole agriculture and agri-food system employed 2.1 million people and provided 1 in 9 jobs in Canada, according to Statistics Canada. The agriculture industry generated \$134.9 billion (around 6.8%) of Canada's gross domestic product (GDP). The food production from the subject land at 192 Street and 36 Avenue provides a stable source of employment, plays an important role in local economies, contributes to innovation in the food system, responds to increased demand for exports, contributes to food affordability, and addresses consumer demand.

According to a Canadian Chamber of Commerce statement, generally, Canadians have an overwhelmingly optimistic view of the industry, whether it is in terms of its environmental impact or as an economic driver. For instance, recent polling by Grassroots Public Affairs reveals that 76% of Canadians consider agriculture to be very important to Canada's economy. At the same time, just over two-thirds recognize its positive effect on the environment. This demonstrates that more work is needed in promoting the sector's contributions to the fight against climate change while working hard to meet our economic and food security targets. In terms of greenhouse gas emissions, Canada's agriculture and agri-food sector is among the greenest in the world, contributing to just over 8% of Canada's overall domestic emissions, in comparison to a global average of 23%. Whether through carbon sequestration or nitrous oxide emission reductions, the sector continues to lead the way in environmental stewardship. Canadians should be proud to know that their food is produced sustainably and in an environmentally conscious manner without hampering economic activity. Heppells's Potato Farm and other Surrey farm producers are examples of sustainable food production practices benefiting our economy.

At the same time, however, we do want to note that the agriculture sector is severely hampered by extraneous regulations and relative lack of recognition by the government as an environmental and economic leader. Federal government departments such as Health Canada and Environment and Climate Change Canada, continue to impose regulations that inhibit the sector's economic competitiveness and growth potential. Canada's government departments should work with industry to evaluate the impact of those regulations and ensure alignment with economic and environmental objectives. The BC and Federal Governments should also work with industry to implement a net-zero transition strategy that creates jobs for all Canadians, promotes innovation, and establishes a business environment conducive to investment. To that end, the agriculture sector must be a key partner in advancing a net-zero strategy.

BC's and Canada's agriculture and agri-food supply chain needs to remain resilient and needs to continue to be a driver of Canada's economy. We urge the Agriculture Land Commission to keep the subject land for food production.

Surrey for Future is a community organization based in Surrey, British Columbia and the main community voice speaking up here about the climate crisis. In 2019, we successfully campaigned for the City of Surrey to declare a climate emergency and adopt greenhouse gas emissions targets consistent with the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). Our group includes members living in 7 Metro Vancouver federal ridings, and is made up of people of all ages, from a variety of ethnic, cultural and professional backgrounds.

We urge you to include the "Federal Lands" (PID 014-120-321, 014-119-129, 014-120-178, 014-120-224, and 014-120-291) in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

As many other submissions have noted, this piece of farmland is uniquely productive and we believe the federal and provincial governments should consider it a key piece of climate change resilient infrastructure due to its ability to produce food crops early in the season and in large quantities. We also note that drainage on this land was found to be quite resilient during the November 2021 atmospheric river events which devastated farmland in Abbotsford and Chilliwack. BC currently imports large amounts of produce from California and Mexico, both of which are increasingly vulnerable to the impacts of climate change. BC should do everything possible to preserve and enhance the province's own agricultural productivity.

The forested portion is also extremely valuable. It provides habitat for wildlife and a refuge from the surrounding suburban landscape for residents. Surrey's Sustainability dashboard notes a steady decline in tree canopy from 2001 to 2013, the last year it was updated. Citizens have been filling in the gap since then and have documented alarming numbers of trees being cut for residential and industrial development. It's safe to say there has been a significant drop in Surrey's tree canopy in the past five years, making this forested area even more important to protect from development.

Thank you for recognizing the value of this farmland to area residents and to British Columbia as a whole. As stated previously, on behalf of all of Surrey for Future's members, we urge you to include this land in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

I am in support of placing the farmlands, at $192^{\rm nd}$ and $36^{\rm th}$ Avenue in Surrey, into the ALR.

The land has been farmed since 1974 by the Heppell family, who have amended the soil over the years to provide good drainage and high quality soil. The location of the land is unique in that it can be planted in February, allowing crops to grow locally and be available to our grocery stores early in the season. It is in a microclimate that allows it to produce vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is extremely productive, providing 70% of British Columbia's domestic potatoes from May until August 1st. It also produces the majority of early carrots, parsnips, cabbage, and winter squash. This makes up approximately 50 million vegetable servings each year, feeding our population.

This is all local—so when California has a drought, or transportation is blocked due to floods or fires, this produce is still providing food to our families. Supplying food locally also reduces greenhouse gases produced by transportation from those distant locations. It is really important that we are able to have a reliable supply of local produce. We can't assume that another country, or other areas of our province, will grow and supply our food, in this time of changing temperatures and rainfall.

This farmland is essential for our food supply.

We cannot rely on the local Surrey City Council or Metro Vancouver to keep this farmland agricultural, even if it is rezoned to "Agricultural". This local zoning can be quickly at the whim of the local council and developers, as recently occurred in nearby South Campbell Heights last year.

Please protect it by placing it in the ALR, so future generations can continue to have a reliable food supply.

My name is David Davis and I reside at generation that in the Township of Langley. I am a 4th generation dairy farmer, our family has been farming for over 120 years on some of the original Hudson Bay farmland. We have 500 Holsteins cows on our farm, we milk 250cows and farm approximately 300acres. We grown corn and grass silage to feed our milking herd.

It is so important that you place this federal surplus land into the ALR.

As a food producer, I am constantly looking for more land to produce more feed for my herd due to the pressures in the Fraser Valley of urban sprawl, development and high land costs. We have now had to look outside of the Fraser Valley to purchase more feed and land to feed our cows. This is not sustainable and very cost prohibitive - due to fuel, labour and trucking costs. I know many dairy farmers that have bought ranches outside of the Fraser Valley, even out of our province to produce feed due to the shortage and cost of land.



As a founder of the Agricultural Land Reserve, and recently retired Richmond councillor I wish to support putting the Federally owned Heppell farmland in the ALR. Others will deal with the issues of the Heppell farm having the best soils in the best climate in Canada. I will concentrate on the need for industrial land using Richmond as an example..

When we adopted the ALR in 1973 we gave municipalities and regional districts several years to fine tune the ALR and remove any land that was not farmable. As federal lands were exempt from provincial control some federal lands were put in the ALR and some were not. Knowing that the need for soil based agriculture would increase in future we permitted golf courses and other uses as a short term use. The US Southwest was warming up and we accurately predicted a slow incremental increase in summer drought in the SW where we get most of our food. We did not predict the atmospheric rivers that have affected both Fraser Valley farmlands and California. Now with food prices rising is not the time to develop farmland for industry but to rehabilitate farmland that was permitted for other uses and put exempted federal lands in the ALR.

Only 5% of BC is viable farmland.1.1% is capable of growing the vegetables we need. The BC Ministry of Agriculture estimates that we will have to bring 92,000 hectares of alienated farmland into production if we are to provide a healthy diet for British Columbians. We anticipated that when we brought in the ALR. In Richmond we approved golf courses, with the requirement that contaminated soils would be removed, and two landfills, provided they could be rehabilitated with soils and compost on top. Federal lands in the Lulu Island Bog were put in the ALR even though they were exempt.

Now Mylora Golf Course is being returned to agriculture. One landfill was successfully covered with soil to create Country Meadows Golf Course. Another 160 acre landfill, Ecowaste, on mined out peat bog has been successfully rehabilitated with top soil. Land in NW Richmond that was taken out of the ALR by the Vanderzalm government was purchased by the city in a \$26 million referendum and developed into Terra Nova Rural Park with allotment gardens and other farm uses.

One 160 acre parcel of Federally owned Lulu Island Bog was traded with the City of Richmond for City owned industrial land by the river. Once primarily cranberries and low bush blueberries, farmed by First Nations and later early settlers, it is now protected in the ALR as the Richmond Nature Park. Another quarter section of Federally owned land, known as the Garden City Lands, was purchased by the City for \$60 million, the price the federal government would have received for high rises on part of the land. The Garden City lands are being successfully developed with Kwantlen Polytechnic University as North America's first farm school. Another 160 acres of federally owned land remains in the ALR. Like the Heppell farm the day of developing federal farmlands is over.

Since Richmond stopped taking land out of the ALR 25 years ago, with removal of 6 acres of the Dhillon farm for industry, the City has accommodated growth with densification. Downtown Richmond is presently being redeveloped with over 60,000 apartment units and all arterial roads are planned for increased density in future.

Over a decade ago Richmond did a study on its industrial lands and found that most industrial sites had only half as much site coverage as permitted. To encourage redevelopment of its industrial land Richmond increased that coverage 1 1/2 times and approved construction of two storey industrial buildings. Richmond has 14% of the industrial land in the region and 34% of the jobs.

The second story of industrial buildings is ideal for Agri-Tech., and could allow for vertical farming. Metro Vancouver's Invest Vancouver Management Committee committee reported that Agri Tech companies do not want to locate on farmland but in cities where their employees like to live, work and play, and recommended that Agri Tech be "located in multi storey development to intensify industrial use". Metro Vancouver is encouraging cities to densify and permit two storey industrial buildings.

In September 2022 Metro Vancouver adopted the following resolution: "That the board coordinate with the City of Surrey in supporting a redesignation for the Heppell properties as a part of the OCP amendment process to preserve it for agricultural use." What we have accomplished in Richmond where land proposed for urban use has been protected for agriculture, and urban areas densified, proves that the Heppell farm is not needed for industry. If residential use and industry are not permitted to expand onto farmland, given the opportunity, they will densify on urban lands.

Where it is clear that the communication needs for which the federal government originally acquired these properties is no longer a consideration, it makes sense for Ottawa to release the lands for other purposes.

While permitting certain industrial designations might initially mean greater profit to federal government coffers, such a move would provide merely short-term financial gain, with no consideration for ongoing needs in the years to come.

Where these lands have a proven record of supplying fresh food to residents of the Lower Mainland (and beyond), in this time of threatened food security issues, it only makes sense for the property to be permitted to continue this useful role; thus, it should be deemed ALR, and used only for agricultural purposes.

Past years, and the previous year in particular, have made grocery shopping more challenging for all Canadians. During Covid the federal government awarded handouts in the form of financial assistance to many citizens. As we go forward, with food prices only predicted to continue rising, people will likely be looking to government for supportive assistance again.

But rather than adding to the already large federal deficit by offering the temporary solution of subsidies to families for groceries, a better option – offering a long-term solution – would be to invest in the future by seeing to it that this richly productive tract of land be preserved for the purpose of growing food.

People can only eat local, if local is available.


We need to support local food production and consumption because: -

• The fresher the produce the higher the nutrient value, therefore local produce which gets to the shops quicker is healthier.

- Local produce needs fewer or no preservative sprays to keep it fresh on its short journey and therefore is healthier (more links are being found between chemicals, cancer and diseases).
- Local produce is better for the environment, less distance to transport, less gas and therefore less pollution, greenhouse gases and negative climate change effects.
- Local produce supports the local community.

We have the good fortune to have some of the most fertile land and the most temperate climate in Canada here in Surrey, we should not waste the opportunity to be self-sufficient.

Currently the statistics show we are doing a poor job of growing food and protecting our food supply.



We need to do better.

Including this valuable farmland in the ALR will show that the government walks the talk as far as increasing food security and keeping us healthy.

2. This land needs to be kept undeveloped to provide essential natural drainage in this area to prevent flooding in the future.

It was stated time and time again during the South Campbell Heights development debate 2021/2022, not just by FHCV but by scientists, local farmers, environmentalists and watershed experts that the area, particularly the Little Campbell river and farmland cannot cope with the change in water flows that are occurring in the area as a result of the current Campbell Heights development.

As a resident of Hazelmere, relying on well water from an Aquifer, I can also testify to the negative impact the Campbell Heights development has already had on the area. The negative effects are without the additional approved 500+ acres in South Campbell Heights.

If this land in question does not end up in the ALR it will ultimately be paved over and its drainage capacity lost. That must not happen. Natural open spaces are important in their own right in mitigating climate change and natural water recharge.

The Little Campbell River, which runs alongside this area to the East, is drier and now completely dries up in summers in parts, threatening the salmon spawning there. Wells in the area have dried up and the water supply to Hazelmere and South Langley farm are threatened. When there are large amounts of rain the river and watershed cannot cope with the surge flows from the storm drains in Campbell Heights resulting in flooding and land damage. This flooding occurs on ALR land in Hazelmere.

This land considered for Inclusion in the ALR provides a large natural drainage area, which if removed and paved over will likely be catastrophic to farming in Hazelmere. No number of drains and planning can mitigate the scale of 1. Loss of natural drainage and 2. The extra unnatural flow of water from the storm drains into the river.

So, not only will there be loss of farmland there will also be further loss of farmland as a result of changes in water flows in the area. A double loss for agriculture in the lower mainland.

This land is critical land for both food production and natural drainage for the larger surrounding area.

The next atmospheric river will be worse.

WE CANNOT KEEP PAVING OVER LARGE AREAS AND NOT EXPECT NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES.

The best solution is to include the land into the ALR so it can continue to be farmed AND provide the essential natural drainage.

I am writing today to ask you move the entire parcel of land where Heppell's Farm is operating, located at 3884 192nd Street in Surrey BC, into the ALR and provide a long term lease to a farmer. This parcel of land currently produces a huge amount of produce for the BC market and is vital to Western Canada's food supply: last year this included about 70% of BC's domestic potatoes, as well as cabbage, parsnips, carrots and squash. This is a very important food supply so as to reduce our dependence on produce from California, particularly at a time when California food production is restricted by water shortages. This situation is likely to be exacerbated in future years.

It is of the utmost importance to promote food security and preserve our local food supply by assisting local farmers wherever we can, and encouraging future generations to become farmers. Like many of our friends and family in White Rock, South Surrey and Langley, we try to make our meals 3/4 vegetables and fruit.

Prices of food have sky-rocketed, impacting especially the very young, the elderly, and the under-employed.

I am writing to express my written feedback and strong support to continue to recognize the longstanding agricultural use of the five contiguous properties owned by the Government of Canada (approximately 89 ha (220 acres) of lands currently leased to local agricultural producers for field crop production.

For the past 50 years, the farm has produced some of the earliest crops of 30 to 50 million servings of vegetables each year. These crops are sold in stores and at farmers' markets around the province.

Given the longstanding agricultural use and productivity of the properties, the Government of Canada's consideration of the disposition of the properties that may leave the lands vulnerable to future changes in land use and particularly for industrial use is most concerning.

I support the recommendation that the Commission considers that the lands may be suitable for inclusion in the ALR. The ALR designation would apply a layer of provincial land use legislation (the ALCA and ALR Regulations) to the lands to preserve their availability for current and future agricultural use.

Additionally, along with the coalition of farmers, residents, farmland advocates, and others, I support the following requests:

- 1) The Federal Government to keep all 300 acres of this parcel in agriculture, forests, and streams by granting a long-term lease to a local farmer and applying to the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission to include it in the ALR; and,
- (2) The City of Surrey to amend its Official Community Plan to prevent the land from conversion to any use other than farming and forest.

Productive farmland is disappearing at an alarming rate all over the world. I fully support the Agricultural Land Commission's proposal to include the 123.6 ha (~305 acres) of land within the City of Surrey, currently leased to Heppell's into the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).

There are two reasons why this inclusion is not just necessary but actually critical.

1. Food security and Self sustainability of the Lower Mainland and British Columbia.

As far as Agricultural land goes, this is about as good as farmland gets.

As a Dietitian I encourage everyone not only to eat more fruits and vegetables, but to eat more local produce. Dietitians of Canada often hold "From the field to the table" presentations.

The reason for our recommendation is simple: the more fruits, vegetables and plant based meals eaten the healthier we are. With health care costs spiralling, any strategies to reduce preventable diseases are high on all level of Government's agendas. This is an easy one – encourage people to eat more locally grown fruits and vegetables and health costs decrease in the long run. HOWEVER, increasing demand for fruits and vegetables requires land available and devoted to growing produce. **People can only eat local if local is available**.

Why is local so important? Why not import what we need?

- The fresher the produce the higher the nutrient value, therefore local produce which gets to the shops quicker is healthier. It is available at farmers markets too, often same day.
- Local produce needs fewer or no preservative sprays to keep it fresh on its short journey and therefore is healthier (more links are being found between chemicals, cancer and diseases).
- Local produce is better for the environment, less distance to transport, less gas and therefore less pollution, greenhouse gases and negative climate change effects.
- Local produce supports the local community.
- Standards in other countries have been found lacking many times for instance E.coli contaminated water is often used to wash produce (Mexico) and often unregulated chemicals can be found on produce from China.

We have the good fortune to have some of the most fertile land and the most temperate climate in Canada here in Surrey, why would we even think about relying on imports in the future?

Local produce, of course, needs local agricultural land -

I am so tired of hearing from developers that their A1 or ALR "investment" land is not being farmed right now so it is not needed, or it is such poor quality and will never be good for farming. It is just a feeble excuse to profit. During the South Campbell Heights application that excuse was used and accepted even though the development put surrounding ALR land that IS farmed at risk.

Just as the ALC approves removal of farmland from the ALR it must also see its duty to add into the ALR land that is currently farmed, highly productive and essential to local food producers when it has the opportunity to do so. It has that opportunity now, here with this land.

Our need for fresh local produce will go on forever and the demand for food and land to grow the food on will increase each year. What about year 2030, 2040 or 2060? This is not just about today. BC has the biggest population growth in Canada and Surrey is one of the fastest growing areas. We need to plan for, and make allowances for the future.

2. Natural land for drainage is essential in this area to prevent flooding in the future further South in the Hazelmere farming area.

As a resident of Hazelmere, relying on well water from an Aquifer, I can testify to the negative impact the Campbell Heights development has already had on the area. And that effect is without the additional approved 500+ acres in South Campbell Heights. If this land does not end up in the ALR it will be paved over and its drainage capacity lost. That must not happen. Natural open spaces are important in their own right in mitigating climate change and irrigating agriculture.

The Little Campbell River, which runs alongside this area to the East, is drier and can completely dry up in summers now, threatening the salmon spawning there. Neighbours' wells have dried up and the water supply to neighbouring farms is threatened. When there are large amounts of rain the river and watershed cannot cope with the surge flows from the storm drains in Campbell Heights resulting in flooding and land damage. This flooding occurs on ALR land in Hazelmere.

This land considered for Inclusion in the ALR provides a large natural drainage area, which if removed and paved over will, I believe, be catastrophic to farming in Hazelmere. No number of drains and planning can mitigate the scale of 1. Loss of natural drainage and 2. The extra unnatural flow of water from storm drains into the river.



Please add my name to the list of supporters of placing the farmlands, at 192nd and 36th Avenue in Surrey, into the ALR.

The land has been farmed since 1974 by the Heppell family, who have amended the soil over the years to provide good drainage and high quality soil. The location of the land is unique in that it can be planted in February, allowing crops to grow locally and be available to our grocery stores early in the season. It is in a microclimate that allows it to produce vegetables before other land in

Canada. The land is extremely productive, providing 70% of British Columbia's domestic potatoes

from May until August 1st. It also produces the majority of early carrots, parsnips, cabbage, and winter squash. This makes up approximately 50 million vegetable servings each year, feeding our population.

This is all local—so when California has a drought, or transportation is blocked due to floods or fires, this produce is still providing food to our families. Supplying food locally also reduces greenhouse gases produced by transportation from those distant locations. It is really important that we are able to have a reliable supply of local produce. We can't assume that another country, or other areas of our province, will grow and supply our food, in this time of changing temperatures and rainfall.

This farmland is essential for our food supply.

We cannot rely on the local Surrey City Council or Metro Vancouver to keep this farmland agricultural, even if it is rezoned to "Agricultural". This local zoning can be quickly at the whim of the local council and developers, as recently occurred in nearby South Campbell Heights last year.

On behalf of Fraser Health Authority, we are writing in support of including the properties located in the Campbell Heights area of the City of Surrey, bounded by 192 St (west), 32 Ave (south), and the Township of Langley municipal boundary (east) in the provincial Agriculture Land Reserve (ALR).

Healthy Food Systems, a pillar of Healthy Built Environments, supports equitable access to and availability of food options. As we navigate the impacts of climate change and rising food prices, the importance of building and maintaining local capacity for food production is becoming more pronounced. Local food systems contribute to food self-reliance, climate adaptation, and strengthen the local economy. The properties produce millions of servings of vegetables annually, which supports access to and availability of fresh, local produce.

The inclusion of these federal properties in the City of Surrey into the Provincial ALR would be indicative of land use planning and community design that prioritizes retaining agricultural capacity and would provide opportunities for increased local agriculture and amenities such as farmers' markets.³ Local agriculture can increase the availability of local produce that can be distributed to stores, farmers' markets and vegetable stands. Enabling citizens to live within walking distance of nutritious food has shown to improve diet quality.¹ Other benefits of access to healthy food options include improved overall health for all citizens.

The inclusion of these properties into the ALR would have the co-benefits of climate change mitigation and preservation of green spaces within the city. Peri-urban agriculture can also support carbon sequestration as well as increase biodiversity⁴. There is strong evidence to suggest that the experience of being in and viewing green spaces has significant physical and mental benefits, including a reduction in stress, depression, and chronic disease, as well as improved concentration, cognitive functioning and social well-being.¹ Early evidence also suggests a positive relationship between the presence of nature/biodiversity and lower rates of cancer and autoimmune disease.¹

Preserving green spaces in the city and expanding the use of vegetation across the landscape, can also mitigate the urban heat island effect. In urbanizing areas, the cooling effects of vegetation through agriculture, parks, and bodies of water, can be significant.¹





Better health.

For example, decreased ambient air temperature is strongly connected to lower levels of heat-related mortality and morbidity. Given the planned densification of residential and commercial uses in the surrounding neighbourhoods of these properties, this is an important benefit of inclusion in the ALR.

Agriculture provides the major source of food that supports British Columbians in meeting the recommendations outlined in *Canada's Food Guide*.⁵ Fraser Health recognizes the importance of supporting local food production and building resiliency to ensure ongoing food security and food system sustainability. In the lower mainland, protection of the ALR from development pressure will be key to preserving local food production capacity.⁶ Local food production has economic, environmental, social and health benefits: food access and availability, supporting biodiversity⁷, income generation, skill building and community development.⁴

Preserving these properties for ongoing agricultural use aligns with the City of Surrey's interest in protecting land for agricultural use⁸, and the Metro Vancouver Regional Food System Action Plan "Goal 1: to increase capacity to produce food close to Home; Strategy: 1.1 Protect agricultural land for food production".⁹ Food self-sufficiency in BC is increasingly important as extreme weather will affect production in California and elsewhere. In 2018, 70% of Metro Vancouver's supply of vegetables was imported.¹⁰

In summary, Fraser Health Authority supports the inclusion of these properties in the Agriculture Land Reserve.

Re: Disposal of Federal lands risks food supply disruptions in Surrey, BC

I am writing to you to make you aware of a threat to British Columbia's domestic food supply and green economy.

Federally owned farmlands, vital to Western

Canada's domesticsummer vegetable supply are being disposed of by PSPC, risking disruption to the summer food supply in Western Canada. The issue has recently been presented to Parliament in the form of a House of Commons Petition (E-4128) by MP John Aldag. I understand that the Government of Canada will respond to the petition during the next weeks. I am writing to you as a grower of produce on the farmlands to provide background information on the situation.

The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

The farmland produces much of Western Canada's first field vegetable production each year. This year the parcel produced approximately 70% of BC's domestic potato supply from May till Aug 1. In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Each year the parcel produces 30-50 million vegetable servings - enough for a serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.

Due to its micro-climate, hilltop location and unique drainage, the farmland produces vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposalof the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

The land has been owned by the Federal Government since the 1940s having been used as a communications facility. In 1974, Heppells Potato Corp began investing in the sandy land and through regenerative agriculture methods, building to soil into its current highly productive state.

The federal government still appears committed to disposing the farmland. Our understanding is that Public Services & Procurement Canada (PSPC) is about to solicit Expressions of Interest from federal departments, Crown corporations, provinces, municipalities and Indigenous groups before offering the land for sale to the public.

Protecting the land is in the public interest:

The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The at-risk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is being squeezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

In addition, the land is centrally located for serving the Metro-Vancouver market allowing deliveries to be made regardless of trade issues and highway closures.

There is substantial public interest in protecting the land:

Millions have learned about the risk losing this land poses on Social Media. **70,000** people have signed a petition at <u>Change.org/savethefarmland</u> asking that the land be protected for farming.

The land has been farmed since 1974 by the Heppell family, who have amended the soil over the years to provide good drainage and high quality soil. The location of the land is unique in that it can be planted in February, allowing crops to grow locally and be available to our grocery stores early in the season. It is in a microclimate that allows it to produce vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is extremely productive, providing 70% of British Columbia's domestic potatoes from May until August 1st. It also produces the majority of early carrots, parsnips, cabbage, and winter squash. This makes up approximately 50 million vegetable servings each year, feeding our population.

This is all local—so when California has a drought, or transportation is blocked due to floods or fires, this produce is still providing food to our families. Supplying food locally also reduces greenhouse gases produced by transportation from those distant locations. It is really important that we are able to have a reliable supply of local produce. We can't assume that another country, or other areas of our province, will grow and supply our food, in this time of changing temperatures and rainfall.

This farmland is essential for our food supply.

We cannot rely on the local Surrey City Council or Metro Vancouver to keep this farmland agricultural, even if it is rezoned to "Agricultural". This local zoning can be quickly at the whim of the local council and developers, as recently occurred in nearby South Campbell Heights last year.

Please protect it by placing it in the ALR, so future generations can continue to have a reliable food supply.

This farmland produces 30 to 50 million servings of vegetables each year. The Heppell farm produces some of the earliest vegetable crops – for Western Canada and all of Canada. Between 30 to 50 million vegetable servings are grown on this property alone. That is enough to feed Metro Vancouver residents for 2-3 weeks.

The Heppell's farm yearly crops include potatoes, cabbages, carrots, parsnips, and squash, sold in grocery stores and at farmers' markets around the province.

This productive land is irreplaceable. However, land designated for buildings must never be arable farmland. Building industrial buildings on arable farmland would be an obscenity.

Paving over our most productive farmland would be a horrific crime. A decision to pave over this precious land, resulting from archaic thinking, would be an unspeakable crime.

Re: Disposal of Federal lands risks food supply disruptions in Surrey, BC

I am writing to you to make you aware of a threat to British Columbia's domestic food supply and green economy.

Federally owned farmlands, vital to Western Canada's domestic summer vegetable supply are being disposed of by PSPC, risking disruption to the summer food supply in Western Canada. The issue has recently been presented to Parliament in the form of a House of Commons Petition (E-4128) by MP John Aldag. I understand that the Government of Canada will respond to the petition during the next weeks. I am writing to you as a grower of produce on the farmlands to provide background information on the situation.

The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

The farmland produces much of Western Canada's first field vegetable production each year. This year the parcel produced approximately 70% of BC's domestic potato supply from May till Aug 1. In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Each year the parcel produces 30-50 million vegetable servings - enough for a serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.

Due to its micro-climate, hilltop location and unique drainage, the farmland produces vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposal of the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

The land has been owned by the Federal Government since the 1940s having been used as a communications facility. In 1974, Heppells Potato Corp began investing in the sandy land and through regenerative agriculture methods, building to soil into its current highly productive state.

The federal government still appears committed to disposing the farmland. Our understanding is that Public Services & Procurement Canada (PSPC) is about to solicit Expressions of Interest from federal departments, Crown corporations, provinces, municipalities and Indigenous groups before offering the land for sale to the public.

Protecting the land is in the public interest:

The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The atrisk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is being squeezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

In addition, the land is centrally located for serving the Metro-Vancouver market allowing deliveries to be made regardless of trade issues and highway closures.

There is substantial public interest in protecting the land:

Millions have learned about the risk losing this land poses on Social Media. **70,000** people have signed a petition at Change.org/savethefarmland asking that the land be protected for farming.

My name is Robyn Freiheit. I am Surrey born-and-raised and a grand-daughter of Portuguese immigrants who were successful farmers in Richmond/Steveston for the course of 5 decades.

I am contacting you on behalf of the public hearing to be hosted tomorrow (Jan 23rd) at Kwantlen Polytechnic University in relation to the <u>Save the Farmland</u> Petition regarding the farmland between 192nd and 36th which is at stake to be developed into industrial land.

I sadly cannot attend this session as I am now based in Porto, Portugal, however, I want to ensure that my presence is recognized despite not being able to attend in person. I am a Food Insecurity Specialist, having dedicated my Master's of Public Health thesis on the topic of contextual factors influencing food insecurity, and seeing what is happening in Canada, and more specifically in the Lower Mainland is extremely upsetting from afar.

While studying in Portugal, my colleagues would never believe me when I told them that food security is an ongoing issue in my home country- a country that is perceived to look after it's individuals as one of the "premier" developed countries said to lead by example. As the Lower Mainland continues to densify, it is loosing sight of food sovereignty, and placing more emphasis on food imports - which not only drive up costs (due to transport and supply and demand), but also have immense environmental costs (further drought, pollution, etc.). Additionally, the concept of commodity over community intensifies as we continue to alienate our farming community, making it more difficult for them to survive and provide for our local citizens.

I do not understand why we could possibly need yet another industrial plot in one of the most crucial lands for food production in BC when we have plenty of land throughout our large province which is perhaps less desirable for agricultural purposes. It does not make sense and something needs to be done.

I am happy to speak to anyone involved in this initiative at the grassroots movement or at a higher political level to be able to re-emphasize the importance of this land being protected for agricultural use, and create a further case why this motion for industrial development cannot occur here.



Governments at all levels have been expressing concern about Canada's threatened food security and claim to want Canadian consumers to obtain more of their food from local farmers.

Last season, approximately 70% of BC's domestic potatoes were produced from this farmland from spring to mid-summer. Cabbage, parsnips, carrots and much of the squash production in Canada also starts here. No other parcel produces so much of BC's local field vegetable supply at this time of year.

Dear Agriculture Land Commission,

I would like to express my sincere appreciation for your attention to the matter of the loss of one of the most valuable tracts of agricultural land in BC, the Federal lands in Cloverdale (192 St north of 36 Ave., 124 ha).

Only 4% of BC's land mass is arable and it exists in a few valleys, where almost the entire population also resides. This creates significant pressure on agricultural land and even with the only Agricultural land reserve in Canada, valuable land is lost from production every year. At the same time our population is increasingly aware of the critical need to produce food for the region, within the region, and that climate change is exerting significant negative impacts on the low lying land that most of our food is grown on, the flood plains of the Fraser River, and other rivers of the province.

The land in question has been well managed and cared for by Heppells Potato Corp. for many years and is highly productive. Because it is high above the flood plain, it has demonstrated persistent immunity to flooding, including the devastating flooding event that impacted our other major food production areas of Sumas and Abbotsford this past winter. Most of our local food production comes from low lying, flood-prone land. Climate change will ensure the risk of flood on this agricultural land will remain high and threaten our food security. The subject land is not threatened. In 2022, climate-change gave us a cool wet spring after a winter of record rains, delaying annual crop planting by several weeks in these low lying areas, and damaged perennial crops (e.g. many blueberry fields have only a small % of the flowers they usually have). The Cloverdale land was not delayed and became more important than ever for providing food to Canadians in the region. Such climate events bring home the point that we need as much land in food production as possible to ensure regional food security.

Disappearing fast are the days when we could depend on other areas of the world to produce our food. Climate change is impacting those regions too. The headline article in the May 2022 issue of The Economist, "The coming food catastrophe" does not exaggerate the risk of climate change, especially in combination with wars, supply chain challenges and inflated prices for everything. We need to create resiliency in our food production system at this moment, not degrading it further. Agri-technology is advancing of course, and well supported by our province, but it won't replace land-based agriculture. We need to maintain and protect our agricultural land to use it on!

I also wish to say a word about the research value of this land and the support of the Heppells over the years. Our research assists BC agriculture to become more sustainable and resilient. We've conducted numerous trials at this site because of the progressive views of the Heppell family to moving towards sustainable food production, and the long history of knowledge of this piece of land. This partnership is extremely valuable to the entire farming community as it supports KPU's applied research mandate and SMEs in the agri-tech field to develop and test environmentally protective bioproducts to replace pesticides and novel IoT monitoring technologies to predict disease threats, as two examples of projects in progress at this moment. This knowledge is disseminated to the entire agricultural community. We also train students for jobs in the agricultural field and without partners to provide the sites for hands-on experiences, we could not turn out capable graduates for our future food systems.

I understand how important this land is to BC food security and urge you to take the necessary steps to protect it by adding it to the BC Agricultural Land Reserve for the future benefit of Canada and British Columbia.

Including this land into the land reserve would ensure its continued availability for agricultural production regardless of future ownership.

As a conservation group we would like to point out that keeping this land in agricultural production also has additional benefits to the environment. The lands on the periphery of a farm but also within the farm provide habitat for all sorts of wildlife. Green space in a city like Surrey with all of its industrial sprawl is very important. 





Proposed ALR Inclusion of Federal Lands in the City of Surrey

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the proposed inclusion of Federal Lands in the City of Surrey into the Agricultural Land Reserve.

On September 8, 2022, representatives from the Metro Vancouver Agricultural Advisory Committee (AAC) appeared at the Metro Vancouver Regional Planning Committee asking for support in keeping the subject properties, referred to as the "Heppell Farm", in agricultural use. While it was recognized that the properties were part of a Federal land disposition process, the members of the AAC expressed concern that the agricultural uses on the lands, which have been active for approximately 50 years, were in jeopardy of discontinuing should the lands be sold. At its meeting, the Regional Planning Committee requested additional information on the ownership and decision-making jurisdiction.

On October 7, 2022, staff submitted a report to the Regional Planning Committee outlining the ownership and history of the property (enclosed). The report detailed the Federal disposition process that was underway and provided options for the long-term protection of the lands for agricultural purposes. This included expressing support to the City of Surrey in its noted intent to re-designate the properties from "Mixed Employment" to "Agriculture" as part of its upcoming planned Official Community Plan review, and then subsequently re-designating the lands from "Mixed Employment" to "Agriculture" in *Metro Vancouver 2040: Shaping our Future*, the regional growth strategy. At the meeting, the Committee passed the following resolution:

That the MVRD Board coordinate with the City of Surrey in supporting a re-designation to Agriculture for the Heppell property as part of the OCP Process.

On October 28, 2022, the Committee's recommendation and the same staff report was considered by the MVRD Board with further discussion by the directors. The Board supported the resolution with

an amendment clarifying that the Heppell Farm is Federally-owned and that the support for redesignation would be for agricultural uses as part of Surrey's OCP update.

Metro Vancouver supports agricultural viability in the region through several mechanisms including through policies within the regional growth strategy, in many ways, including:

Metro Vancouver 2040: Shaping our Future:

2.2.3 In collaboration with the province and the Agricultural Land Commission, identify and pursue strategies and actions to increase actively farmed agricultural land, emphasize food production, reduce barriers to the economic viability of agricultural activities, ensure the management of farmland is in concert with groundwater resources, and minimize conflict among agriculture, recreation and conservation, and urban activities.

Metro 2050 (draft):

2.3.12 (c)(i) Member jurisdictions will adopt Regional Context Statements that include policies that protect the supply of agricultural land and strengthen agriculture viability including those that assign appropriate land use designations to protect agricultural land for future generations and discourage land uses on agricultural lands that do not directly support and strengthen agricultural viability.

Amending the City's OCP and regional land use designations of the subject properties to "Agricultural" would support these policies and would provide a layer of protection for the continued use of the "Heppell Farm" for farming purposes; however, long-term protection of these properties, in support of an ongoing viable agricultural operation and a valuable source of local food for this region, would be best achieved through inclusion into the Agricultural Land Reserve. Additionally, many citizens throughout the region and the farming community, by way of a petition, and the City of Surrey, have expressed interest in retaining the properties for long-term farming.

Thank you once again for providing Metro Vancouver with the opportunity to comment on this proposed inclusion.

RECOMMENDATION

That the MVRD Board receive for information the report dated September 26, 2022, titled "Federally-Owned Farmland in Surrey".

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On September 8, 2022, members of Metro Vancouver's Agricultural Advisory Committee presented to the Regional Planning Committee asking for Metro Vancouver to support the protection of a five-parcel, 120-hectare site in Surrey for continued agriculture production. The properties are currently designated Mixed Employment in the Regional Growth Strategy, designated "Mixed Employment" in Surrey's Official Community Plan and are zoned General Agriculture (A-1); they are federally-owned, and are currently under a Federal disposition process. This process requires the Federal government to consider a range of obligations that are not publicized, including determining any asserted or established Aboriginal or treaty rights.

Given that the properties are owned by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada, a department of the Federal Government focused on national economic development and trade, the long-term protection of the properties for agricultural purposes would be best achieved under municipal or provincial ownership, being included into the Agricultural Land Reserve, and being designated Agriculture by the regional growth strategy and Surrey's Official Community Plan.

Changing the property's designation to "Agriculture" as part of the City's OCP update process and including them into the Agricultural Land Reserve has been supported by a Surrey City Council resolution. This report is being provided to the Committee in response to questions asked at the September meeting and to requests for additional information.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide additional information regarding the federally-owned farmland also known as Heppell's farm, located between 36 and 44 Avenues along 192 and 196 Streets in the City of Surrey and the Federal Government's disposition process for the lands.

BACKGROUND


On September 8, 2022 the Regional Planning Committee received an invited presentation from two members of the Metro Vancouver Agricultural Advisory Committee (AAC) where they presented a memo (Reference 1) identifying concern over the potential loss of a large, 120-hectare federally-owned parcel of farmland in Surrey. The AAC members requested that the Regional Planning Committee assist in ensuring these properties are not lost from agricultural production. Regional

Planning staff were requested by the Committee to report back with more information on the status of the federal land disposition process as well as the jurisdictional authority over the lands.

PROPERTY DETAILS

Approximately one third of the City of Surrey falls within the Agricultural Land Reserve, a provincial designation established in 1973 with the intent of prioritizing agriculture and protecting the most fertile farm lands throughout the province. Several properties located between 192 Street and 196 Street and between 36 Avenue and 44 Avenue in Surrey, also known as Heppell's Farm, were not included in the Agricultural Land Reserve when it was first created, but have been actively farmed since that time, producing a sizeable portion of fresh vegetables that serve regional, provincial and national markets (Figure 1).

Figure 1: Subject Properties





Figure 3: Surrey Campbell Heights Land Use Plan

During the preparation of *Metro Vancouver 2040: Shaping our Future*, the regional growth strategy, the subject properties were designated Mixed Employment to align with Surrey's Official Community Plan (OCP) (Figure 2). In Surrey's OCP, adopted in October 2014, the properties are designated Mixed Employment, which was derived from the Campbell Heights Land Use Plan completed in 2000, identifying the properties as "Technology Park or Business Park" (Figure 3).

Figure 2: Regional Land Use Designations, Metro 2040

PROPERTY OWNERSHIP AND DISPOSITION PROCESS

The subject properties have been leased to, and farmed by, the same family for approximately 50 years. The 120-hectare site and all five properties within it are owned by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED), a department of the Federal Government responsible for improving conditions for investment and expanding Canada's role in global trade. Over that time, the ISED had not considered a change in land use to support other economic development purposes and therefore the long-standing lease for the farming operation remained in place. In 2017, ISED determined the land was no longer required for federal purposes and at that time began a disposition process, which is established by the Treasury Board through the Directive on the Management of Real Property (Reference 2).

This Directive sets out the due diligence for federal property disposition which includes determining the following components:

- title to the land;
- environmental conditions;
- physical performance;
- heritage value or archaeology sites;
- security conditions; and
- market value and appraisals.

Over the past year, Public Services and Procurement Canada, the federal department working on behalf of ISED to manage the land disposition, compiled the required resources and reviews for the subject properties and now anticipates being able to post a request for a Notice of Expression of Interest in the properties before the end of 2022. These Notices are sent to all levels of government, including First Nations, and are open for 30 days. Priority for considering interest in acquiring federally-owned lands is reviewed in the following order:

- federal departments;
- crown corporations;
- provinces; and
- municipalities and Indigenous groups.

Any submissions made as part of that Expression of Interest must include an identified public purpose for the future use of the lands. This process is intended to be open and transparent and based on the determined market value of the properties.

CITY OF SURREY'S POSITION

The subject properties have been in the media for several months after a petition was launched by a City of Surrey citizen seeking support to keep the properties in agricultural production (Reference 3). The petition's signatories are asking the Federal Government to continue to lease the land for farming purposes, and to work with the Province to include the parcels within the ALR. The petition also asked the City of Surrey to adjust its OCP to ensure that the land is retained over the long term for agricultural use.

As noted at the Regional Planning Committee on September 8, 2022, on July 11, 2022 the City of Surrey demonstrated support for the continued use of the land for agricultural purposes by passing a Council resolution that states:

- 1. The 220 acres of exceptionally fertile farmland located at 192nd Street and 36th Avenue and currently zoned Agricultural (A-1), be designated as Agricultural as part of the Official Community Plan review process taking place in 2023;
- 2. The City work with the Federal and Provincial governments to move towards bringing these lands into the Agriculture Land Reserve; and
- 3. Staff conduct an assessment of all agricultural, food producing land in Surrey with a view to protecting these lands for the purpose of addressing future food security requirements.

The City is in the early stages of updating its OCP and while the timeline for the update has not been released, depending on the scope of the OCP review, could take several years to complete. Updating the OCP will also necessitate an application to Metro Vancouver to amend the regional land use designation for the site.

JURISDICTION AND AUTHORITY

Managing the jurisdictions and authorities for decision making for the subject properties is complicated and involves several levels of government. References have been made to the Agricultural Land Reserve and the City's OCP land use designations as possible methods to ensure the long-term protection of the land for agricultural purposes, but the ownership of the lands is a critically important factor.

Federal Authority

Canada's constitutional structure establishes the authority of the Federal Government over that of all lower-tier governments. Under Federal ownership, the inclusion of the subject properties into the Agricultural Land Reserve under Provincial legislation, or the re-designation of the lands in the City's OCP from "Mixed Employment" to "Agricultural" would not supersede Federal jurisdiction over the preferred use of the lands. While for the most part federal departments work to comply with local land use policies and regulations, conflicts over use have been upheld in court in favour of federal interests, even in cases where properties are occupied by a tenant or not used for Federal Government purposes.

City Jurisdiction

While uses on federally-owned lands are ultimately at the discretion of the Federal Government, a local government can indicate its intent and support for land uses through OCP land use designations and zoning. In this instance, the subject property is already zoned General Agriculture (A-1) by the City of Surrey's Zoning Bylaw, No. 12000 and, as noted above, the City has passed a resolution indicating support for changing the OCP land use designation of the properties from "Mixed Employment" to "Agricultural" during its upcoming OCP update process. While the OCP process could take several years to complete, and given that the Federal Government is planning to post its request for Expressions of Interest in the coming months, as the authority over its OCP land use designations, the City has the option to amend the subject property's land use designation at any time prior to or during its OCP update. This would make the City's desired land use direction for the properties clear

and illustrate its commitment to retaining the agricultural use and to pursuing an Agricultural Land Reserve inclusion application to any potential purchasers of the lands before the Federal Government disposes of them.

Metro Vancouver Jurisdiction

An additional related land use policy that has not yet been discussed is the role of the regional growth strategy in the protection of these lands. Should the MVRD Board determine that there is a regional interest in the long-term protection of these lands for agricultural purposes, and to support the City of Surrey's interest in re-designating the lands to "Agricultural" and bringing them into the Agriculture Land Reserve, an amendment to the regional growth strategy can be initiated at any time to amend the regional land use in *Metro 2040* from "Mixed Employment" ("Employment" in *Metro 2050*) to "Agricultural". Such an amendment would better support the City's application to expand the Agricultural Land Reserve and it will be made clear to all parties interested in the possible purchase of the lands, as well as those involved in the City's OCP update, that the OCP land use change is being done to not only protect the continued agricultural use of the lands, but also to be consistent with the regional land use designation.

Should a non-government entity succeed at purchasing the properties, they would be required to comply with all applicable Provincial, regional, and local policies and regulations.

LONG-TERM AGRICULTURAL PROTECTION

Options for long-term agricultural protection of the subject properties will depend on the direction of the Federal Government and the outcome of the current land disposition process. Because the disposition of federal lands follows procedures established by a Directive under the authority of the federal *Financial Administration Act*, it cannot be circumvented nor adjusted by a lower-tier government; however, the Province, the City, and Metro Vancouver could submit expressions of interest for the retention of the lands for the public purpose of food production over the long term.

ALTERNATIVES

This is an information report. No alternatives are presented.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications to this report.

CONCLUSION

A five-parcel 120-hectare piece of active farmland located in Surrey is owned by the Federal Government and is part of a current land disposition process. Many citizens, the farming community and the City of Surrey have expressed interest in retaining the properties for farming use. While amendments to the regional growth strategy and the City of Surrey's OCP and inclusion into the Agricultural Land Reserve can happen at any time, as long as the property is Federally-owned, the Federal Government's constitutional jurisdiction can override that of a lower-tier government. Long-term protection of these properties for agricultural purposes would be best achieved under public inclusion into the Agricultural Land Reserve, and being designated Agricultural by the regional growth strategy and the City's Official Community Plan as soon as possible.



I am in support of placing the farmlands, at 192nd and 36th Avenue in Surrey, into the ALR.

The land has been farmed since 1974 by the Heppell family, who have amended the soil over the years to provide good drainage and high quality soil. The location of the land is unique in that it can be planted in February, allowing crops to grow locally and be available to our grocery stores early in the season. It is in a microclimate that allows it to produce vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is extremely productive, providing 70% of British Columbia's domestic potatoes from May until August 1st. It also produces the majority of early carrots, parsnips, cabbage, and winter squash. This makes up approximately 50 million vegetable servings each year, feeding our population.

This is all local—so when California has a drought, or transportation is blocked due to floods or fires, this produce is still providing food to our families. Supplying food locally also reduces greenhouse gases produced by transportation from those distant locations. It is really important that we are able to have a reliable supply of local produce. We can't assume that another country, or other areas of our province, will grow and supply our food, in this time of changing temperatures and rainfall.

This farmland is essential for our food supply.

We cannot rely on the local Surrey City Council or Metro Vancouver to keep this farmland agricultural, even if it is rezoned to "Agricultural". This local zoning can be quickly at the whim of the local council and developers, as recently occurred in nearby South Campbell Heights last year.

Please protect it by placing it in the ALR, so future generations can continue to have a reliable food supply.



My family lives on the immediate perimeter of this land, on 196th street, and we're extremely worried that it will be turned into an industrial business park, like we've seen happen with much of the surrounding area.

You're likely already aware of how valuable this land is to our province's food supply, as it produces 50 million servings of vegetables each year ⁽¹⁾. That kind of production can't be overlooked, especially given how climate change and supply chain issues continue to challenge our access to imported food.

In addition to food supply, this land is a significant part of our community. Hundreds of residents use this land for its walking trails, kids grow up playing in the wooded areas, and there are countless animal species that call this home.

If this land were to get developed, the interface between our residential neighbourhood and the industrial space would simply not be compatible. The existing industrial area on the west side of 192^{nd} street is already the source of light pollution and safety issues related to street racing, which happens almost every weekend with no signs of police or security intervention. Bringing the noise, lights, and unsightliness even closer would devastate property values and harm the mental heath of the people who live here.

A nearby property at the corner of 196 street and 36th avenue is currently being developed into industrial buildings. During the design phase, residents were led to believe that a buffer of old growth trees would be saved, a set-back of 30m would be maintained, that there would be no onstreet parking, and that the buildings would be painted a neutral color. Re: Disposal of Federal lands risks food supply disruptions in Surrey, BC

I am writing to you to make you aware of a threat to British Columbia's domestic food supply and green economy.

Federally owned farmlands, vital to Western Canada's domestic summer vegetable supply are being disposed of by PSPC, risking disruption to the summer food supply in Western Canada. The issue has recently been presented to Parliament in the form of a House of Commons Petition (E-4128) by MP John Aldag. I understand that the Government of Canada will respond to the petition during the next weeks. I am writing to you as a grower of produce on the farmlands to provide background information on the situation.

The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

The farmland produces much of Western Canada's first field vegetable production each year. This year the parcel produced approximately 70% of BC's domestic potato supply from May till Aug 1. In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Each year the parcel produces 30-50 million vegetable servings - enough for a serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.

Due to its micro-climate, hilltop location and unique drainage, the farmland produces vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, Rehas been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposal of the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

The land has been owned by the Federal Government since the 1940s having been used as a communications facility. In 1974, Heppells Potato Corp began investing in the sandy land and through regenerative agriculture methods, building to soil into its current highly productive state.

The federal government still appears committed to disposing the farmland. Our understanding is

that Public Services & Procurement Canada (PSPC) is about to solicit Expressions of Interest from federal departments, Crown corporations, provinces, municipalities and Indigenous groups before offering the land for sale to the public.

Protecting the land is in the public interest:

The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The at-risk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is being squeezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

Am I writing today regarding the federal lands located on 192 Street in the ALR. https://www.alc.gov.bc.ca/proposed-alr-inclusion-of-federal-lands-in-the-city-of-surrey/

If the ALCs decision boils down to the question of "farm" or "business park" (as the land is currently zoned in the Campbell Heights NCP), **I absolutely believe this land should be agricultural land.** However I also wish to give my thoughts on the power the ALC has to improve land use overall in BC.

I believe the ALC has a strong position in the decision making process for this land. Since the ALC is acting on its own initiative in this case, the ALC is beholden only to the public in its decision. If the ALC withholds the land from development, the ALC then deprives the City of Surrey from higher future property tax revenues and permitting fees.

As mentioned the land is zoned a as a "Technology or Business Park" as detailed in the Campbell Heights neighbourhood plan (https://www.surrey.ca/sites/default/files/media/documents/CampbellHeightsNewLAP.pdf)

In my opinion this type of single-use suburban zoning is a bad decision and poor land use. If the land is not included in the ALR, it should be treated for the scarce resource that it is, and be mixed use urban density allowing a mixture of housing types and businesses, not wasted on a generic suburban business park.

If instead the land could provide hundreds of homes in a variety of housing sizes and types and space for local businesses, then in the context of unaffordable housing prices in Metro Vancouver, I believe this is something that should be explored.

While this goes a little outside the ALC's objective of simply preserving agricultural land, I believe we could see real improvements to land use across the province if the ALC is unafraid to use its broad discretionary powers to force municipalities to take land scarcity seriously with the threat of ALR "confiscation".

Too often, land omitted from the ALR is wasted by suburban sprawl instead of being used effectively and efficiently. I believe that the ALC could encourage municipalities to fix their systemic issues with suburban zoning that leads to the loss of more agricultural land in the long term as pressure builds from sprawl.

My own neighbourhood in Walnut Grove in the Township of Langley was omitted from the ALR, and in the 80s and 90s it was developed in a suburban style. So much valuable land was wasted with large setbacks and other zoning requirements. I am frustrated with seeing this

approach still happening today.

In short, if such action is possible, I would endorse ALC negotiating with the City of Surrey to zone this land for a high-density walkable neighbourhood with a mixture of residential and commercial types, in lieu of ALR inclusion, for the greater good of encouraging better land use around the province. If no such agreement can be reached, I am in favour of it being included it in the ALR.





The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposalof the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. I am writing to you to make you aware of a threat to British Columbia's domestic food supply and green economy.

Federally owned farmlands, vital to Western

Canada's domesticsummer vegetable supply are being disposed of by PSPC, risking disruption to the summer food supply in Western Canada. The issue has recently been presented to Parliament in the form of a House of Commons Petition (E-4128) by MP John Aldag. I understand that the Government of Canada will respond to the petition during the next weeks. I am writing to you as a grower of produce on the farmlands to provide background information on the situation.

The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

The farmland produces much of Western Canada's first field vegetable production each year. This year the parcel produced approximately 70% of BC's domestic potato supply from May till Aug 1. In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Each year the parcel produces 30-50 million vegetable servings - enough for a serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.

Due to its micro-climate, hilltop location and unique drainage, the farmland produces vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposalof the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

The land has been owned by the Federal Government since the 1940s having been used as a communications facility. In 1974, Heppells Potato Corp began investing in the sandy land and through regenerative agriculture methods, building to soil into its current highly productive state.

The federal government still appears committed to disposing the farmland. Our understanding is that Public Services & Procurement Canada (PSPC) is about to solicit Expressions of Interest from federal departments, Crown corporations, provinces, municipalities and Indigenous groups before offering the land for sale to the public.

Protecting the land is in the public interest:

The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The at-risk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on

the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is being squeezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

Prime Lower Mainland Farmland Could be Sold for Industrial Development & Lost to Farming Forever Productive

farmland is disappearing at an alarming rate all over the world. Fortunately, in British Columbia for nearly 50 years successive provincial governments have supported the preservation of B.C.'s farmland though the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). Before the ALR over 6,000 hectares of farmland were being lost every year to urbanization and non-farm uses in BC. The federal government has recently announced the entire 300-acre property (220 acres of farm and 80 acres of forests and streams) is "surplus to its requirements" and it may be sold. Even with a price tag of hundreds of millions of dollars it could be bought by a developer and turned into industrial buildings. In anticipation of this, the land has already been ear-marked by the City of Surrey for industrial development. A coalition of farmers, residents, farmland advocates, politicians and others are calling on 1) the federal government to keep all 300 acres of this property in agriculture, forests and streams, either by granting a long-term lease to a local farmer or by applying to the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission to include it in the ALR, and(2) the City of Surrey to amend its Official Community Plan to prevent the land from conversion to any use other than farming. Governments at all levels have been expressing concern about Canada's threatened food

security and claim to want Canadian consumers to obtain more of their food from local farmers. These governments have also been expressing concern about GHG emissions generated by the tens of thousands of trucks needed to transport foreign food to Canada. They are constantly reminding us of the vulnerability of foreign supply chains. Politicians in the Lower Mainland, Victoria and Ottawa have all been saying we need to keep scarce local farmland for local farmers. The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The at-risk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is being squeezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

In addition, the land is centrally located for serving the Metro-Vancouver market allowing deliveries to be made regardless of trade issues and highway closures.

Productive farmland is disappearing at an alarming rate all over the world. Fortunately, in British Columbia for nearly 50 years successive provincial governments have supported the preservation of B.C.'s farmland though the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). Before the ALR over 6,000 hectares of farmland were being lost every year to urbanization and non-farm uses in BC. This loss was slowed by the establishment of the ALR, which is now recognized as the most successful system for protecting scarce foodlands anywhere in the world.

But what if the ALR doesn't apply to a piece of productive farmland in BC, meaning there would be nothing to prevent a landowner from shutting down the farm and building commercial or industrial buildings?

That's exactly what's happening to a 220-acre piece of productive farmland in the Lower Mainland. This farm – bounded by 192nd Street and 36th Avenue in Surrey - has been successfully producing potatoes, carrots, cabbages and squash for the past 50 years. In fact, this piece is at the core of field vegetable production in BC from May- early July. No other parcel produces so much of BC's local field vegetable supply at this time of year.

However, this farmland is not protected by the Agricultural Land Reserve. Why? Because it is owned by the federal government, which is not bound by the ALR unless it voluntarily agrees to include a piece of land in the ALR. The federal government has recently announced the entire 300-acre property (220 acres of farm and 80 acres of forests and streams) is "surplus to its requirements" and it may be sold. Even with a price tag of hundreds of millions of dollars it could be bought by a developer and turned into industrial buildings. In anticipation of this, the land has already been ear-marked by the City of Surrey for industrial development.

A coalition of farmers, residents, farmland advocates, politicians and others are calling on:

(1) the federal government to keep all 300 acres of this property in agriculture, forests and streams, either by granting a long-term lease to a local farmer or by applying to the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission to include it in the ALR, and

(2) the City of Surrey to amend its Official Community Plan to prevent the land from conversion to any use other than farming.

Governments at all levels have been expressing concern about Canada's threatened food security and claim to want Canadian consumers to obtain more of their food from local farmers. These governments have also been expressing concern about GHG emissions generated by the tens of thousands of trucks needed to transport foreign food to Canada. They are constantly reminding us of the vulnerability of foreign supply chains. I am writing to register my strong opposition to a plan to sell federally-owned land in Surrey, BC, for development. This land should be rezoned from industrial to agricultural zoning, included in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

As per news reports and information from the Heppell family, vegetables growers who have been farming this 200-acre parcel for five decades, this is important farm land for local food production. Unique in it's soil, drainage profile and microclimate, this one parcel of land produced nearly 70 per cent of BC's domestic potato supply between May and August last year, along with other early vegetable crops, some 30-50 million servings, according to the growers.

"The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does," writes Tristin Bouwman, crop manager at Heppells Potato Corp.

The idea that such valuable public land, is being considered for sale to developers and potentially soon to become warehouses, is beyond outrageous, especially as we grapple with supply chain issues and future food security in Canada. This land is far more valuable to Canadians for food production, not for profits to developers or short term cash in the public coffers.

Though the federal government, and specifically the Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED), has managed this land for years, it recently declared the land to be "surplus to its needs" and is in the process of disposing of it, which will have significant implications to the domestic field vegetable supply. Consumers are keenly aware of the fact that we can no longer confidently rely on global food imports, and that climate change, and related weather events, are making it more difficult and expensive to buy fresh vegetables. And the cost of imports, both economically and in terms of emissions related to transportation, means building a stronger domestic food supply is vital.

This land is centrally located to serve the MetroVancouver market and Vancouver Island, and should obviously remain in food production, and be protected under BC's Agricultural Land Reserve.

Our hard-working local farmers struggle with inflated land prices, labour shortages, weather and so many other issues to provide us with fresh, local food. This is a simple way for the federal government to make one small decision that could help foster a more sustainable food system. Much more needs to be done as local food security is a topic that Canadians understand and expect their leaders to address.


I believe it is imperitive more than ever to protect our farm lands. Please take the time to read and educate yourselves about this important piece of land. This needs to stay in the protected agricultural land reserve.

- The 300-acre parcel consists of 220 acres in potatoes, carrots, cabbage and squash, and 80 acres in forests and streams.
- The farmland is exceptionally sandy, well-drained, enjoys its own unique microclimate. This allows for early crops production. Western Canada's earliest potatoes, carrots and cabbage have been produced from the land for decades.
- From May to early July, 25-50% of BC's local potatoes, carrots, cabbage come from this one parcel alone (depending on the crop and year).
- An estimated 30 and 50 million servings of fresh, nutritious vegetables are produced annually. Enough for one serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.
- Retailers, farmers markets, restaurants and foodbanks across the province depend on this produce. By July, the produce reaches all Western Canada.
- Due to its ability to produce crops so early, food from this parcel directly displaces foreign imports from the United States and Mexico.
- This parcel is at the core of BC's food supply from May to early July. No other parcel produces so much of BC's local field vegetable supply at this time of year.

Re: Disposal of Federal lands risks food supply disruptions in Surrey, BC

I am writing to you to make you aware of a threat to British Columbia's domestic food supply and green economy.

Federally owned farmlands, vital to Western Canada's domestic summer vegetable supply are being disposed of by PSPC, risking disruption to the summer food supply in Western Canada. The issue has recently been presented to Parliament in the form of a House of Commons Petition (E-4128) by MP John Aldag. I understand that the Government of Canada will respond to the petition during the next weeks. I am writing to you as a grower of produce on the farmlands to provide background information on the situation.

The unique parcel of farmland is vital to Western Canada's domestic food supply.

The farmland produces much of Western Canada's first field vegetable production each year. This year the parcel produced approximately 70% of BC's domestic potato supply from May till Aug 1. In addition, it produced the majority of early carrots, cabbage, parsnips and much of the earlies winter squash. Each year the parcel produces 30-50 million vegetable servings - enough for a serving for every Metro Vancouverite for 2-3 weeks.

Due to its micro-climate, hilltop location and unique drainage, the farmland produces vegetables before other land in Canada. The land is so unique that potatoes can be planted in February and carrots can be harvested as late as December. No other farmland contributes so much to BC's domestic field produce supply from May to the beginning of August as this 220-acre parcel does.

Public Services and Procurement is currently in the process of disposing of the farmlands.

This parcel, located at 3884 192nd Street has been managed for years by Ministry of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED). ISED declared the land to be surplus to its needs and the Parcel is in the process of being disposed of. Disposal of the farmland makes it extremely vulnerable to being lost from food production which has significant implications for the domestic field vegetable supply.

The land has been owned by the Federal Government since the 1940s having been used as a communications facility. In 1974, Heppells Potato Corp began investing in the sandy land and through regenerative agriculture methods, building to soil into its current highly productive state.

The federal government still appears committed to disposing the farmland. Our understanding is that Public Services & Procurement Canada (PSPC) is about to solicit Expressions of Interest from federal departments, Crown corporations, provinces, municipalities and Indigenous groups before offering the land for sale to the public.

Protecting the land is in the public interest:

The land plays a core role in the domestic food supply due to capacity to produce early crops reliably. This impacts overall market access for the domestic supply and the regions resiliency to food crises.

Food supply chain continuity and market access:

BC has a vibrant domestic produce supply that feeds a substantial minority of BC's produce demand. Since, the province does rely heavily on produce imports from drought-stricken California. Maintaining market access for domestic producers requires continuity of supply for retailers and wholesalers. The at-risk farmland plays a critical role in supply continuity. When other fields in BC begin to produce, they cannot reliably be harvested after rainfall. At such times, retailers rely on the Federal lands with its superb drainage to keep their shelves stocked. A continuous domestic supply is vital both for a healthy population and helps lessen and stabilize food prices.

Climate change mitigation and adaptation:

California's produce travels 1000's of kilometers with all the associated greenhouse gas emissions. As climate change induced droughts and water restrictions intensify, California's export capacity is beingsqueezed. Meanwhile, extreme weather events in the last two years have exposed BC's vulnerability to highway closures and flooding of key agricultural areas. The land in question is not in a flood zone and is extremely resilient to extreme weather events.

In addition, the land is centrally located for serving the Metro-Vancouver market allowing deliveries to be made regardless of trade issues and highway closures.

There is substantial public interest in protecting the land:

Millions have learned about the risk losing this land poses on Social Media. **70,000** people have signed a petition at Change.org/savethefarmland asking that the land be protected for farming.



Re: Proposed Inclusion of KKS Territory in the Agricultural Land Reserve

I. Introduction

We are legal counsel for Katzie, Kwantlen, and Semiahmoo First Nations ("KKS"). We write on behalf of our clients with respect to the Agricultural Land Commission's proposal to include the following federally held land in the Agricultural Land Reserve (the "Proposal"):

(the "Land")

KKS holds and exercises inherent and Aboriginal rights, including title, in relation to the land and waters within their territories which are protected pursuant to the *Constitution Act, 1982*. KKS also holds stewardship responsibilities and decision-making authority in respect of their territories pursuant to their laws and protocols. KKS is committed to upholding their laws and protecting their rights and homelands for their current and future generations.

The Land comprises an integral component of KKS's territories, and they collectively assert Aboriginal rights, including title, over this area based on traditional and contemporary use and occupation.

Legal obligations with respect to Aboriginal rights, including title, aside, the Agricultural Land Commission (the "ALC") lacks the jurisdiction to create an Agricultural Land Reserve ("ALR") on the Land.



Given the gravity of the potential impacts and infringements of the Proposal on their inherent and Aboriginal rights, and the lack of ALC jurisdiction to include the Land in the ALR, KKS strongly suggests that the ALC cancel the public hearing scheduled for January 23, 2023 (the "Hearing") and refrain from taking any further steps to advance the Proposal.

II. Background

KKS collectively asserts (and indeed holds) Aboriginal rights, including title, over the Land based on their exclusive and sufficient occupation and control of this area at the time of the Crown's assertion of sovereignty. KKS's Aboriginal title claim is further supported by their customary laws regarding collective use, kinship ties, economic and social structures, and cultural and spiritual practices. As you are aware, Aboriginal title encompasses the right to make decisions about how the land is used and the right to benefit economically from the land.

KKS ancestors have occupied, governed, stewarded, and used the Land, waters, and resources of their territories, which include the Land, since time immemorial. The Land formed part of a landscape that was vital to the socio-economy of KKS including with respect to travel, trade, and the harvesting of resources. The Land continues to be culturally, spiritually, and economically important for KKS, and their members continue to exercise their rights in this area except where they have been restricted due to government regulation, displacement, and development.

KKS recently learned that, without any notification to KKS, on December 7, 2022 the ALC posted a message on its website notifying the public of its intention to include the Land in the ALR.¹ The message included a link to a document titled "Proposal Summary & Property Information" (the "Proposal Summary"), and a notification for a public hearing occurring on January 23, 2023 (the "Hearing").²

According to the Proposal Summary, the ALC is taking steps to include the Land in the ALR pursuant to section 17(1) of the *Agricultural Land Commission Act* (the "ALCA"). The Hearing purports to satisfy the ALC's procedural requirement under section 17(2) of the ALCA and provide an opportunity to solicit public feedback for the ALC's consideration.

Although the ALC appears to have devised and initiated a plan to include the Land in the ALR, its actions are entirely misguided in respect of both its own jurisdiction as well as its legal obligations to KKS, as explained below.

III. The Law

A. ALC Does Not Have Jurisdiction Over the Land

Given that the ALC's plan to designate the Land as ALR has never been discussed or even communicated to our clients, it is hard to fathom why the ALC, an agent of the Provincial government enabled by Provincial legislation, would have the impression that it has the authority or jurisdiction to designate federal public land as ALR land.

As the ALC is aware, the Land has been used for national defence purposes for many years pursuant to Canada's jurisdiction under section 91(7) of the *Constitution Act*, 1867. The Land currently falls under Canada's jurisdiction as Public Property pursuant to section 91(1A) of the *Constitution Act*, 1867 on the basis of Canada's proprietary interest in and use of the same.³

The law regarding the application of the constitutional doctrine of interjurisdiction immunity (the "Doctrine") in respect of section 91(1A) land (which includes the Land) is clear. In brief summary, when the application of Provincial legislation on section 91(1A) land would interfere with a vital aspect of a federal undertaking, or a matter of core federal competence, the Provincial legislation must be read down to avoid the interference.

The application of the *ALCA* to the Land would result in a serious infringement of Canada's ability to manage and administer the Land pursuant to Canada's rights and obligations in respect of public lands. Accordingly, the *ALCA* does not apply to the Land.

B. The Duty to Consult and Accommodate

The Crown's duty to consult is part of a process of fair dealing and reconciliation which flows from the Crown's obligation to act honourably in its dealings with Indigenous Peoples.⁵ The duty is triggered at a low threshold – it arises whenever the Crown has knowledge, real or constructive, of the potential existence of an Aboriginal or Treaty right and contemplates conduct which could adversely affect that right.⁶

KKS has a long-standing and public claim to rights, including title, in respect of the Land which the Province and the ALC have real or constructive knowledge of. The inclusion of the Land in the ALR will have a significant impact on the ability of KKS members to exercise their inherent and constitutionally protected rights in this area, particularly their right to benefit economically from their lands. Consequently, the duty to consult is triggered by the Proposal.

The scope of the Crown's duty to consult varies depending on the circumstances, including the seriousness of the potential adverse effect on the inherent and constitutionally protected rights at issue. Where consultation falls on the low end of the spectrum the Crown is still required to give notice, listen carefully to the affected First Nation, and attempt to minimize adverse effects. Where the duty to consult falls at the higher end of the spectrum the Crown's obligations are more extensive and require providing the affected First Nation an opportunity to participate formally in the decision-making process. Further, the Crown must seriously consider the First Nations' concerns, integrate those concerns into the proposed plan of action wherever possible, and be willing to make changes based on information exchanged during the

consultation process.¹¹ In all cases the Crown must consult in good faith with the intention of substantially addressing the First Nation's concerns.¹²

Based on the gravity of the potential impact of the Proposal on KKS's inherent and constitutionally protected rights, the Province's obligations lay at the highest end of the consultation and accommodation spectrum outlined in *Haida*. ¹³ The inclusion of the Land in the ALR will have a serious and negative impact on KKS's inherent and constitutionally protected rights by restricting activities within the Land to those permitted by the ALCA and preventing KKS from stewarding the land as it sees fit.

It is well established within Canadian jurisprudence that the constitutional doctrine of the honour of the Crown and its corollary, the duty to consult, must be approached in a generous and purposive manner. Such an approach has led to the extension of the duty to consult to include "economic rights and benefits closely related to and derivative from Aboriginal rights." This means that economic rights which derive from and are closely related to Aboriginal rights are protected by the duty to consult. By effectively sterilizing the Land from many of the economic opportunities which would otherwise be available, the Proposal stands to meaningfully diminish KKS's inherent and constitutionally protected rights, including their right to benefit economically from their land and to manage the economic resources therein.

KKS has a very strong claim to the Land, as is being illustrated to Canada in an ongoing consultation and accommodation process associated with Canada's proposed disposition of the Land. The Proposal would result in significant long-term (potentially permanent) impacts. The risk of non-compensable harm is high. As such, the Province must be prepared to accommodate KKS by adjusting its plans where necessary, negotiating satisfactory interim solutions, enabling KKS's participation in the decision-making process, and ensuring adequate economic accommodation. To date, the ALC has failed to contact KKS in any way with respect to the Proposal, let alone engage in the deep consultation required as a result of KKS's very strong claim to the Land and the potential detrimental impact of the Proposal.

Lastly, the impacts of an activity, and the Crown's corresponding obligations, must be assessed within the larger context, including the cumulative effects of previous activities on the exercise of the right.¹⁷ Where past activities have resulted in an infringement, the relatively small impact of a new activity must be "placed within the context of the damage that had already been done."¹⁸

KKS's territories have been subject to ongoing and extensive restrictions since the arrival of the first European settlers. KKS members have seen the land base available to them for the exercise of their inherent and constitutionally protected rights continually diminished. The Proposal would further erode their ability to exercise their rights and cannot be viewed in isolation from the detrimental cumulative impacts of regulations and development within KKS's territories.

While the Province holds the ultimate legal responsibility for consultation, ¹⁹ and legal obligations pursuant to the *Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act* ("DRIPA") and associated DRIPA Action Plan, as a representative and agent of the Crown, the ALC owes KKS a duty to consult and accommodate with respect to the Proposal.

As outlined above, KKS is entitled to the highest degree of consultation and accommodation based on the strength of its claim to the Land and the serious detrimental effect of the Proposal on its inherent and constitutionally protected rights. However, contrary to even the most basic and minimum consultation requirements, at no time prior or subsequent to posting the December 7th, 2022 message on its website did the ALC inform KKS of Proposal. The ALC has made no attempt to contact KKS to provide notification or information related to a decision which stands to significantly impact KKS's rights. It appears the ALC has already decided on its course of action and is taking steps to advance the process as quickly as possible without due regard for KKS's constitutionally protected rights.

Given the strength of KKS's claim to the Land, the Province and the ALC have a constitutional obligation to be prepared to adjust their plans as necessary to accommodate KKS's concerns, and to provide KKS an opportunity to participate formally in the decision-making process. ²⁰ However, it is evident from the Proposal Summary and the scheduling of the Hearing on short notice over the holiday season that the ALC has unilaterally pre-determined that it will advance the Proposal process without any consultation with KKS. Such pre-determination and lack of consultation constitutes a grave failure of the Province's constitutional obligation to consult and accommodate KKS with respect to the Proposal.

IV. Conclusion

As outlined above, the ALC's conduct in respect of the Proposal constitutes a failure of the Province's obligation to meaningfully consult and accommodate KKS which rises to the level of a breach of the honour of the Crown. The Province is legally required to rectify this breach immediately.

KKS strongly suggests that the ALC cancel the Hearing and refrain from taking any further steps to advance this Proposal on the basis that the Proposal and the ALC's process for advancing the same represent a fundamental misunderstanding of the ALC's own jurisdiction, will cause significant impacts and infringements on the inherent and constitutionally protected rights of KKS as detailed above, and is an egregious failure of the ALC's constitutional obligation to consult and accommodate KKS.

Our clients can be available for further dialogue as may be necessary with the ALC or the Province to provide additional clarity and build better understanding. We respectfully await your timely response.

Hello,

I am writing to strongly support the proposed ALR Inclusion of the Federal Lands at 192-196 Street, North of 36 Ave. on the Langley/Surrey boarder which the Agricultural Land Commission is initiating a proposal to include 123.6 ha (~305 acres) of land within the City of Surrey into the Provincial Agricultural Land Reserve. This section of land is currently used for farming and is bordered by a forest.

By including this land in the ALR, it will continue to be used as farmland which currently produces 30-50 million servings of potatoes, carrots, cabbage, parsnips and squash annually. This is enough fresh food to put a vegetable serving on every Metro-Vancouverite's dinner plate for 2-3 weeks. As harvest begins before other vegetable fields in BC, this land reduces BC's reliance on imported vegetables.

Therefore, it is an important part of local produce production.

The City of Surrey had identified this land as a HUB in the <u>Biodiversity Conservation</u> <u>Strategy</u> On the Biodiversity Strategy Habitat Suitability Map, the land used as farmland is listed as low for Habitat Suitability and the forest is listed as Moderate to Moderate/High. In Appendix J. It is listed as Number 59 - Large forested natural area. Follows edge of ALR and runs through proposed Hub B. This forested area provides an important north south wildlife movement corridor and an important edge habitat to the ALR field. I feel it is important to recognize and protect a forested corridor on perimeter of the ALR. This forested area provides walking trails for the residents who live near by, it cools the air for residents and provides much needed "wild" area for native plants, animals and insects to live.

The land should be in the ALR and not be used as part of the Campbell Heights Industrial Park. Residence in Langley that live near the current industrial park have already been negatively impacted by its development. Large areas of forest have already come down and this has increased the air temperatures and decrease the areas that residence can walk and take a break from the heat in the summer. The forest section of land mentioned above provides a cool shelter in the summer for the residence and currently provides shelters for animals whose homes where cut down when the forests were removed to build the current Campbell Height Industrial park
